#### Recent Fiction.

Two books of recent date which have been much reviewed and criticized in the literary world are Pierre Loti's "Disenchanted," and Hallie Erminie Rives' "Satan Sanderson." minie Rives' "Satan Sanderson."
They are both remarkable for a certain peculiar trait. They are possible in plot, but not probable, so there is an element of the strikingly melodramatic in them both. "Disenchanted," which title, by the way, gives no idea of the book, is a tale of the harem, of the Turkish woman as she is to-day, and of the struggle of the western training she receives from a French governess and from European books with the prejudice and restraint surrounding her. Unhappily the latter prevails, and the three poor little veiled ladies, cousins and companions in their narrow life, after unhappy in their narrow life, after unhappy matches with impossible husbands and a platonic affair with a French author find premature death in different ways. Of the three, the author loves ways. Of the three, the author loves one, but finds no way to make his love known with any prospect of success. The four friends meet secretly in an eastern city, probably Constantinople, under another name, and have their only pleasant hours together. At the last the Turkish women plead with the author to make their hopeless lives the subject of a hook to less lives the subject of a book to arouse general sympathy and assist-ance. They chiefly rebel at the cus-tom which gives them to a husband whom they have never seen. "Satan Sanderson" is quite a different sort. of story, with the favorite plot of an unusual resemblance between two men, and the loss of memory on the part of one of them, with the result that the bravery of the other causes their identity to be interchanged with the part of consequences. dramatic consequences. Of course, it's not a very likely story, but it raises the interesting psychological question, would a mere physical resemblance result in such deception of everyone who knew the parties well? Is not personality more powerful than that? The story is not without merit, and strikes one as being admirably adapted to being dramatized for the popular stage. The favorite picture of lar stage. This is what Sarah Otis says: "Only thrice should a woman leave her home, to be christened, to be mar-ried, and to be buried." So runs the old saying.

To-day women have swerved far from that narrow ideal and still our demand is for greater freedom, broad-er, lives and new lines of work. To many it seems that in making this demand women are thoughtlessly or selfishly seeking their own good at the expense of the race, but it really ts not for themselves alone but for the good of all that women are seeking new paths in life. Economic changes have robbed both men and women of their controls. their ancient fields of labor. Men who have thus lost their old work must find new fields of labor or perish. Masculine generosity makes women's problem different. Our choice lies between finding new fields or sinking into the condition of a parasite. In struggling to obtain a foothold in business and politics we are instinction. business and politics we are instinctively taking the only way open to save ourselves from that state.

of the female to become parasitic has manifested itself. Always it has heralded the decay of the female, of her male descendants, and of her race.
