



The Schoolroom.

In the basement is probably the best-fitted schoolroom in the city. The room is finished in oak and fitted with electric lights. Running north and south are seats and desks of polished oak. Separated by wide wooden doors, which move noiselessly, are eight class rooms similarly fitted, the whole so arranged that with the doors down there are separate rooms which at will can be thrown into one. On Saturdays, Sundays and the afternoons of other days after 4.30 Jewish children will be taught here. Here also the daily service of the congregation will be held.

To-Day's Ceremony. This will be most elaborate and attractive. Not more than two or three members of the present congregation were present at the similar function on Richmondstreet. Admission is by ticket only and no one of whatever sect or creed who has subscribed to the building fund has been omitted in the invitation.

Rev. A. Lazarus, the present rabbi, will conduct the dedication service, the choral part of which will be under the leadership of Cantor Rev. M. Solomon. The solo parts will be taken by Mme. Adde Strauss Youngheart. The special soloists for the service are Mr. Albert Mansfield, basso, of New
