## MRS. VIAU GETS A NEW TRIAL

Death Sentence of the Court of Trial Quashed.

Evidence Taken Before Coroner's Jury Should Not Have Been Admitted in the Trial—Subscriptions Raised to Pay for Masses for Sir Adolphe Chapleau—Message From Blanco—Montreal Notes.

Montreal, June 17.—(Special.)—Cordeila Viau, widow of the murdered man Perrier, at St. Canute, who was found guilty of the murder of her husband, has been given a new trial by the Court of Appeal, composed of Judges Bosse, Blanchet, Hall, Wurtelle and Oulmet. The reserved points were as follows: 1. Should the evidence taken at the coroner's jury have been admitted in the trial? 2. Was it legal to put Samuel Perrier, an alleged accomplice, in the box at the trial? 3. Should the letters alleged to have been written to Ladouceur by Madame Viau, the defendant, be admitted at the trial?

The verdict of the court was that the verdict of the court of trial should be quashed and a new trial ordered, but with out any restriction on the judge as to the admission of Perrier's evidence. On this point the Hon. Mr. Justice Wurtelle, who presided with his colleagues, holding that Perrier's evidence should not be admitted. On the other points the court agreed.

The court took the ground that the fundamental principle of British law that persons accused before the courts cannot be permitted to give evidence against themselves. No British subject can be compelled to incriminate himself before the courts. It was also held that the evidence taken before the coroner's jury should not have been admitted to the court at the trial.

**GIVEN THE LIMIT OF THE LAW.**  
Dave Irvine sentenced to Fourteen Years at Kingston.

Guelph, June 17.—Judge Chadwick sentenced David Irvine this morning, imposing the extreme penalty the law provides for burglary. The prisoner, when asked if he had anything to say in his defense, said that he had nothing to say in his defense, and when he accused Irvine of bringing Thompson to court to tell falsehoods, the prisoner broke in with an angry protest: "I never brought him here," he said, "he came here of his own accord; he volunteered to give evidence." The judge concluded by sentencing Irvine to fourteen years in Kingston Penitentiary. On hearing the sentence the prisoner's face grew livid and he shouted, "Fourteen years for the innocent, one year for the guilty." He would probably have grown abusive had he not been hurried off to the jail.

**OLD TEMPLE BURNED.**  
A Loss of Four Million Yen Involved by Fire at Hsiao, Japan.

Seattle, Wash., June 17.—The steamer Kinshu Maru has arrived here, 16 days from Yokohama. Among the passengers was Lieut. J. Fujitani of the Japanese navy, who comes to this country to watch the construction of war vessels being built at Philadelphia and San Francisco for the Japanese Government, and incidentally to observe the developments of the war.

The Kinshu brings news of the destruction by fire, May 22, of an old temple known as the Hsiao-temple, at Hsiao, Hsiao-shan District, Szechuan Province, together with various valuable buildings adjacent to it. The total loss will be \$4,000,000 yen. The temple was built about 100 years ago. The fire was caused by a burning lamp coming in contact with a mosquito curtain. One of the inmates lost his life.

A serious fire at Kyoto, May 23, caused a loss of 100,000 yen to the warehouse company and destroyed the East Hanway Temple, worth 100,000 yen or over.

A case of plague was discovered among the Chinese passengers on a ship which was burned. The Turks are committing horrible atrocities, and two Serbian women have been murdered.

Successful Convention Held at Osgoode-Denomination Making Numerical Gains—Notes From the Capital.

Ottawa, June 17.—Rev. A. A. Cameron returned this morning from the sixty-second annual convention of the Ottawa Baptist Association, held in Osgoode this week. Delegates were present from some 35 churches in the Ottawa Valley. Reports of the standing of the various Baptist Churches in the district were received, and showed that the denomination is making large numerical gains in the Ottawa Valley.

The delegates numbered over 200, fully one-half of whom were ladies, who attended in the interests of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Baptist Church.

Resolutions were passed tending to strengthen the coming prohibition campaign, and a resolution in favor of the proposed Anglo-American alliance was received with great enthusiasm. The Baptist denomination will work hard to roll up a great majority for the temperance party in the coming plebiscite.

**PEASANTS ROBBED JEWS.**  
Lemberg, Austrian Galicia, June 17.—Gangs of peasants yesterday attacked and plundered the Jewish shops at Fystrak, near Raszow, and wounded several Jews. The police fired on the mob, killing six of the rioters and wounding five more. Nine persons were killed during the rioting.
