A CALL DOWN FOR TARTE.

SEYMOUR WIRES HIS STORY OF BATTLES WITH CHINESE

Allied Troops Advancing to the Relief of the Legations at Pekin Were Attacked by Boxers and Imperial Chinese Troops, Who Were Repulsed.

As Railroad Had Been Entirely Demolished He Decided to Withdraw to Tien Tsin-Was Hampered By Ais Wounded-Seized Guns and Supplies-Gives Details of the Casualties in the Allied Forces During His Perilous Trip-Hundreds of

London, June 30.—(3 a.m.)—The adventures of the hard-fighting allies, under admiral Seymour, the reaching of Anting, 12 miles from Pekin, the decision to retreat, the capture of rice and immense stores of modern arms and ammunition, affording material for a strenuous defence until relieved. The Cabinet is Doubtful.

The Cabinet failed to ratify the agreement at to-day's meeting. In fact, the document, in its inception and various stages of development, was regarded as properly open to such doubts as to warrant the belief that the foseign consuls as a body. certainly never entered into the agreement. In addition to the subjects above mentioned as forming part of the agreement, it appears that the consuls bound themselves to acquit the Chinese Government of any responsibility for noting, murder and pillage in the treaty ports, if any foreign warship should enter such port in violation of the agreement. No safeguard was even interposed to secure the exemption of warships whose commanders might be unaware of the state of affairs in the treaty ports and the prohibition against their entry.

An Apparent Conflict.

There was an apparent conflict between some of the provisions, and, in fact, the whole reputed agreement bore the appearance of a rough memorandum, which the Cabinet concluded could never have received the assent of all the foreign consuls,
