# BRITISH GOVERNMENT HAS ADOPTED THE PROTECTIVE PRINCIPLE TO SOME EXTENT, DUIT IMPOSED ON COAL EXPORTED, AND ON SUGAR, MOLASSES AND OTHER IMPORTS

Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Delivered Yesterday the Most Important Budget Speech

in the Nation's History—New Taxation to the Extent of £11,000,000—Loan of £60,000,000 to Be

#### The British Budget Statement.

The presentation of Great Britain's financial statement by Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, yesterday must have proved startling to the Cobdenites and other free traders. It shows distinctly that the protective principle has been accepted in regard to coal, sugar and other commodities. While the Chancellor does not admit his conversion to the idea of protection, he has certainly to some extent adopted it. ## Sixty Millions in Five Years

Rothschilds Want Georgian Bay Canal and Will Begin Construction at Once.

Ottawa, April 18.-(Special.)-The Georgian Bay Ship Canal, via the French River and the Ottawa River, is a live issue. Mr. Haggart declared himself in favor of it in the transportation debate to-day, and said it would give the cheapest traffic rate of any water or rail system for the products of the Canadian and United States western

It will be remembered Parliament some years ago chartered a company to build this canal system and to take tolls on it. This charter has got into the hands of English capitalists of almost unlimited means, and they are now ready to build it. They will build it within five years, and make it accommodate vessels drawing 20 feet of water. What they want is for the Government to guarantee the cost of construction on sixty millions of dollars. For this guarantee, they will give Canada the right of expropriation at cost price, or they are willing to build and operate the system themselves, provided their ownership of it is not interfered with for ninety-nine years. They are confident that the system
