Cold Storage Enables Growers to Keep

Back Their Fruit During a Glut. London, Dec. 15 .- An interesting experiment in the direction of arresting the ripening of fruit by the refrigerating process has just been concluded by the technical education committee of the Kent County Council. For the purposes of the experiment two small chambers were constructed, each being fitted with a "brine wall"-a flat tank, fitted close to the wall of the chamber and containing brine cooled by the refrigerating machine On Aug. 26 quantities of apples, pears, plums, French beans and tomatoes, were placed in the "cold store," in and 40 degrees Fahrenheit. The fruit, etc., was examined at intervals of about three weeks, and it was found Hamburg, Dec. 16.—The German mail that the plums and the vegetables did the experiment proved successful in the case of the apples, the ripening of which was arrested for at least a month. It is believed that the cold storage system will prove of considerbenefit to fruit growers if carried out on a large scale, inasmuch as it will enable them to keep back their produce from market in times

Many Millions of British Subjects India Actually Starving.

The appalling extent of the famine n British India is shown by extracts from missionaries' letters. Forty millions of British subjects are actually starving. About 2,000,000 bushels of American wheat have already been shipped to India from New York and San Francisco. It was this extraordinary demand which started the recent rise of 26 cents a bushels, which is equivalent to \$27,000,000 to American farmers on the year's crop. "Those who constitute the rank and file of our churches are always in a condition bordering upon starvation. Every night 80,000,000 people lie down hungry. The average income of every man, woman and child in India is less than 1 cent a day. "Grain riots are common. Merchants will not sell grain, largely because they know the price will greatly in-

crease. So the people break open granaries and threaten to kill the merchants. They say: 'We shall soon die without grain; if you interfere we will kill you in the struggle, and it will be all the same.' Then they say to the police: 'Arrest us for stealing and support us in jail. It will save us from death by starvation.' Parents are deserting their children. Cattle are being sold for the value of their hides. In one week at Bombay there have been 800 deaths, or 50 per cent above the normal.
