CUSTOM COLLECTIONS \$989,020 INCREASE OF \$116,941 FOR 1907

London Returns Are Very Gratifying-Trade Took a Tremendous Jump Last Year-Two Last Months Show Falling Off.

That London's trade is growing by leaps and bounds is evident at once by a glance at the customs returns, which show that last year's collections amounted to practically one million dollars.

But for the fact that the railways are not storing such immense quantities of coal as in former years, in all probability the figures would have

"The year has been a most prosperous one, in fact, one of the largest in the city's history," said Colector Elliott, "and merchants all report that business has been good. The falling off in collections in the last two months of the year is not any indication that trade has been any lighter. Besides, the duties on coal being lighter owing to no big shipments being made by the railroads, there seems to be a disposition on the part of merchants in this district to buy more largely from Canadian manufacturers. ARE INCREASING.

"These purchases are constantly i nereasing. A number of American firms have within the last year or two established branches in Canada and are supplying goods which formerly had to be imported and duties collect-

The total collections for the year are \$989,020 44, as compared with \$872,079 07 in 1906, an increase of \$116,941 37.

The returns for December show a decrease of \$6,279 80, the figures being \$72,919 90 for the last month, compared with \$79,199 70 for December, 1906.
