

FOUR RUNS IN FEW HOURS BREAK REST OF FIREMEN

None of Fires Serious, But Team Runs Away With Hose Sleigh.

After a period of inactivity from December 28 last until last evening at 8:30 o'clock, the firemen have during the past fourteen hours had four runs in response to alarms from different sections of the city and one runaway accident.

The first alarm was turned in from the neighborhood of Flynn's tannery. An oil-tank car placed on the siding near the tannery was being prepared for the removal of the oil. The workmen being unable to release the top, due to frost, had taken some oil waste and set fire to it to heat the top.

The huge alarm was turned in from the vicinity of Flynn's tannery, but on the arrival of the brigade from central hall, the fire was already out.

Street Car on Fire.

At 7:30, after the firemen had just finished the alarm, when again in the second alarm was turned in from the vicinity of Flynn's tannery. A wire connecting the trolley pole and the controller had been shorted, and the car, No. 64, standing in the turn, the firemen from No. 10, responded and extinguished the blaze. The damage to the car would amount to about \$15 as estimated by Manager King.

At 8:30 a.m. the third and general alarm was turned in from the Grand Trunk.

Tower Alarms.

The switchman's tower alongside the C. T. R. tracks, between the Grand Trunk and the street, caught fire from an overheated stove. The company from central hall extinguished the blaze with the aid of the chemical apparatus. The damage would be covered by \$10.

It was while responding to this alarm that the team attached to the hose sleigh from No. 5 hall, at the corner of Gray and Adelaide streets, ran away.

At the corner of Colborne and Baywell streets the sleigh runner caught in the M. C. R. tracks. The sleigh was upset, the three firemen, three horses and the team made a dash down Bathurst street. Reaching Thames street, the horses turned again east on King, ran to the central hall and were found waiting there.

Three-Mile Run.

In all they had covered a distance of three miles with no damage resulting and no injuries to the firemen.

At 9:15 o'clock this morning an alarm was received from Lawson & Jones on Clarence street.

A spark from an adjoining furnace had ignited dust in a conveying pipe. The use of the chemical apparatus was required to extinguish the blaze. No damage was done.

REJECTED 118TH MEN NOT DISCHARGED FROM ARMY

May Be Attached to Construction Battalions or Form Nucleus of Unit.

The 251 men of the 118th Battalion who were rejected by a recent medical board as being unfit for first line trench duty will probably all be utilized in the new forestry and construction battalions which are to be authorized. At present the men are discharged, but have been transferred to "casualties" and in the usual order of things would have been discharged eventually if no other use could have been found for them. As there are one or two construction battalions at present in the county, it is probable that they may be attached to them or they may be saved to form the nucleus of the new battalions.

Nothing definite has been decided in this respect, but at least the men have so far been saved to the county.

CRUELTY ALLEGED IN NEGLECTING OF ANIMALS

County Residents Report Cases to Police Which Will Be Probed.

Many complaints have been sent to High Constable E. F. Wadsworth from residents of Middlesex County, advising him that certain persons are neglecting their stock, particularly horses, by permitting them to remain outdoors during the winter weather. The complaints in each case did not refer to people in destitute circumstances and unable to provide shelter, but had reference to certain farmers who could well afford to provide their stock with better accommodations.

The statute provides a heavy penalty for such treatment of horses and cattle, and High Constable Wadsworth has taken steps to enforce the provisions of the act.

All the county constables were instructed today to report such cases and prosecute.

Several cases will be investigated by county constables without delay.

LIVE HOGS ESTABLISH RECORD PRICE FOR CITY

Several Loads Sell for \$12.25 a Cwt. on Local Market.

What local buyers say is a record price for live hogs in London was established this morning, when several loads sold for \$12.25 a cwt. on the local market.

Shortage of suitable feed caused many farmers to sell their hogs early. In the fall and this is said to be chiefly responsible for the scarcity and high price of the present time. Many farmers killed even small hogs and in many cases sows.

Official government reports say that the situation is acute, the price of being made to get the farmers to preserve their stock.

ELGIN OFFICERS ARE ORDERED TO FRANCE

Lieut.-Col. Green Unable to Go Owing to Illness.

ST. THOMAS, Jan. 10.—Word has been received in the city to the effect that Major F. G. Stanbury, who went overseas as second-in-command of the 21st Battalion, is in France. He is at present connected with one of the Canadian battalions in France for further training.

Lieut.-Col. Green, the former commander of the 91st, was also ordered to France a few days before Christmas, but owing to an attack of grippe, he was unable at that time to go, but is expected with him now see the war-torn country.

Pte. George Robert Turner, who enlisted at this point with the 23rd Battalion, has been declared killed in action for official purposes. Pte. Turner's wife and five small children reside at 42 Colborne street. He was reported missing on June 2, 1916, and the military authorities have received no word as to whether he has been killed or taken prisoner, and six months having elapsed he is placed on the records as killed in action. The records as Mrs. Turner is drawing her pension.

LEDoux IS ACQUITTED ON CHARGE OF BRIBERY

\$100 Given for Valuable Advice in Making Supplies.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—Charles Ledoux of Montreal was this afternoon acquitted on the charge of bribing Inspector Gray with a payment of \$100 in connection with militia department supplies. The jury was out 50 minutes.

The defence was that Gray, a man of 20 years' experience on military equipment in the British war department, had advised Ledoux as to proper methods and where to purchase it, and had given him "the formula" for points, etc., saving him hundreds of dollars," according to defendant. It was for this service he had given Gray the money. To show the straightforwardness of the transaction, Ledoux produced his firm's books, containing the entry of the payment.

ITALIANS PROMPTLY EJECT ENEMY FROM OUTPOST

Austrian Artillery Aggressive in Travi-nole Valley.

ROME, Jan. 10.—Via London.—"In the Ledro valley," says today's war office report, "violent artillery fire was directed against our positions on the heights north of Rio Tonale. The enemy succeeded in entering one of our outposts on the southern slopes of Glan Dore, but was at once driven off. In the Travi-nole valley, the enemy artillery was particularly active against the Colbrion area, but no attack followed."

On the remainder of the front our artillery as usual bombarded the enemy's lines of communications and billeting areas."

MAYOR TO INTRODUCE HIS MUNICIPAL PLANS

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REPARATION DEMANDED

London, Jan. 11.—The Manchester Guardian's London correspondent, forecasting the terms of the Entente Allies' reply to President Wilson, says:

"Restitution, reparation and securities are demanded, and the note gives some indications of the aims of the Allies in redrawing the map of Europe. The principle governing this must be the question of nationalities."

"Certain reforms are mentioned. Belgium must regain her independence and be indemnified for her losses. The borders of France must be redrawn in a spirit of restitution. Italy must redeem her provinces, and the borders of the Balkans must be redrawn in conformity with nationality and history. Russia must be given a warm sea. Great Britain is not mentioned, nor is the question of colonies."

"The reply also deals with the American proposal for a league to enforce peace, which it approves in principle, but questions how such a league can be brought about and the machinery by which peace can be enforced."

"The striking thing to the world is that while the president directed the note to each of the allies, the Allies' reply is one."

tachments against various places along this front. All attacks were repulsed completely.

Rumanian Front, Front of Archduke Joseph, German and Austro-Hungarian troops yesterday obtained further successes in the difficult mountain fighting between (about 2,000 to 3,000) the Suchitza Valley. Several points of support were captured by us from the enemy. North of the Otus road, Infantry Regiment 35, under the leadership of its brave commander, took strongly-constructed and tenaciously-defended heights positions by storm and hand-to-hand fighting.

Claim 300 Prisoners.

"Near Marset and Raccasa the captured line was maintained against hostile attacks. Six officers and more than 300 men were brought in as prisoners, and the booty comprised six machine guns."

"Army Group of Field Marshal von Mackensen: There were no important events."

The official statement on the Macedonian front operations reads:

"Macedonian Front: We were successful in a patrol engagement on the Struma."

ADVANCE OF MILE

PETROGRAD, Jan. 10.—Via London.—Russian troops attacking the German lines in the region of Lake Babit, west of Riga, have scored an advance of more than a mile, capturing a position between the Tirla marsh and the River Aa, the war office announced today.

In fighting in this region since Friday last the Russians have captured 21 heavy guns and 11 light guns.

The text of the statement reads:

"Western front: The battle in the region of Lake Babit, west of Riga, continues. Our detachments, after a stubborn struggle, took possession of the enemy's position between the Tirla marsh and the River Aa, and advanced (about 1 1/2 miles) southward, capturing some prisoners."

"Enemy attacks upon our detachments occupying a position east of the village of Kalsen, eight versts south-west of Lake Babit, were repulsed by our fire and counter-attacks."

War Material Captured.

"Since Friday we have captured in the region of Lake Babit 21 heavy and 11 light cannon, 11 mmbers, two searchlights and great numbers and variety of arms and equipment."

In the region of Mestrophilans, north-east of Lake Wisniewsky, we made a successful assault on enemy trenches, capturing prisoners and various materials."

In the region of the village of Minche, on the Shara, south of the Slutsk highway, one of our aviators hit an enemy airplane, which fell into the hands of our troops."

"During last night several squadrons of enemy airplanes dropped bombs on Lutsk."

Success in Rumania.

The repulse of repeated Teutonic attacks against the Russian lines along the Moldavian frontier, notably in the Kasimo River region, is announced in today's war office report, as follows:

"Rumanian front: Repeated enemy attacks against one of the heights north of the village of Slonki were frustrated by our fire and counter-attacks."

"During Monday evening and Tuesday morning the enemy delivered eight attacks on one of the heights north of the Kasimo River. All the attacks were repulsed."

Rumanians Triumph, Too.

"In the course of the day the Germans twice attacked the Rumanians in the region of Monaster-Machin, on the River Kasimo, but were beaten back with great losses."

"In the region south of Rekeza the enemy succeeded in pushing back the Rumanians. During the night, as a result of a counter-attack, the position was restored. We took 270 men prisoner and captured three machine guns."

"Throughout the day, the enemy, with the assistance of heavy artillery, stubbornly attacked our detachments in the region of the mouth of the Kilmik. All the German attacks were repulsed with heavy losses by our fire and counter-attacks. In one of these attacks we took prisoner six officers and more than 50 men."

The statement reports conditions on the Caucasus front unchanged.

TEUTON OPERATIONS IN RUMANIA REVIEWED.

BERLIN, Jan. 10.—Via Sayville.—The following official review of recent military operations in Rumania was given out at army headquarters today:

"In regard to the fighting from January 4 to January 8 the headquarters of the ninth army reports: Victory was obtained in a battle of five days on the Putna River. The enemy's positions were naturally strong and well fortified, the principal points being the bridgeheads of Fundeni and Fokshani."

"After preparations had been made an attack was delivered on January 4. The forefield positions were taken on January 5. A German division penetrated the bridgehead of Fundeni on January 5."

"A great Russian counter-attack was launched on a front of 25 kilometres (15 1/2 miles). The Russians planned to place the centre of the ninth army, but failed on account of the tenacious resistance of our troops and the offensive power of the well-trained West Prussian

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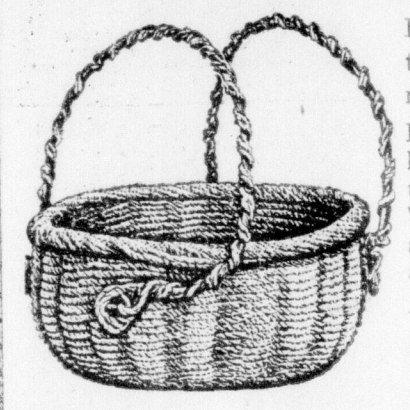
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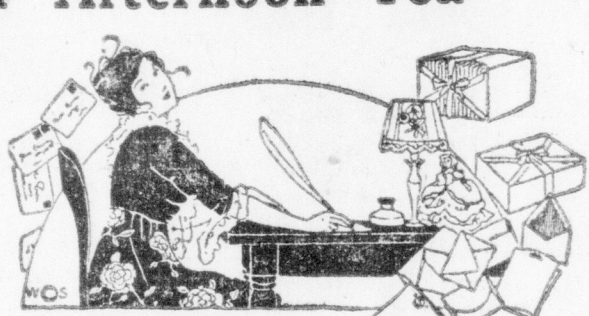
