LONDON POLICE TIP
LEADS TO ARREST
AND OPIUM SEIZURE

Chinaman Is Arrested at
Windsor—Not Wanted
Here.

Hun Thuy Chee the Chinaman who
was arrested in Windsor on Saturday on
the charge of having opium in his pos-
session, is not known to the local de-
tectives nor do they want him here.
This is what one gathers from the re-
ply that was sent to Windsor police to the
question as to whether Chee should be
turned over to London to be dealt with.
The opium which is valued at nearly
\$4,000, went through London on the C.
P. 11, one week ago Saturday, checked
to Windsor. The local detectives dis-
covered the facts and tipped off the
Windsor authorities with the result that
Chee was captured on Saturday when
he went to the station for the parcel,
which had been lying in the baggage-
room for the week.

HIGH TOTAL AT ST. MARYS.
ST. MARYS, Nov. 17.—St. Marys has
raised \$387,850 for the Victory Loan,
with an objective of \$250,000. Last
year \$310,000 was subscribed. It is
expected that the total will yet reach
\$500,000. The town wins the flag and
two crowns. Blanshard Township has
subscribed \$125,000, with an objective
of \$100,000.

VOCATIONAL TALKS
TO BE GIVEN BOYS
AT "Y." THIS WINTER
Committee Busy Arranging
Season's Program.

To issue a pamphlet which will be of value to workers among boys by giving them information concerning the methods of working with their individual groups, was one of the plans decided upon by the vocational guidance committee of the London advisory committee at the meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. recently. A committee was appointed to select speakers to prepare and give, if possible, vocational talks before high school students, technical school students, eighth grade pupils and working boys who do not attend school. The subjects which were chosen as of special interest, and which are to be taken by the various speakers are: "Choosing a Life's Work," "The Professional Field," "The Commercial Field" and "The Industrial Field."

This committee has decided to approach the board of trade and ask it to take up the matter of vocational guidance, and if possible to hold a vocational survey. This survey will be concerned with the following matters: Professional, commercial and industrial opportunities in the city, age of entry, necessary preparations, minimum and maximum salaries, and possibilities of promotion.

It was also urged that vocational guidance bureau be established at the Y. Information regarding recent surveys, suggestions, pamphlets, magazines and books could be then secured by those interested to help them in choosing a vocation. The committee, which was increased, now consists of the following members: E. A. Miller, Ed. Reid, Rev. H. Ferguson, Rev. J. Laverie, Fred Landon, Richard Saunders and G. Sherwood Fox.

February is to be celebrated as "father and son" month. During the month a special effort to further the work of sex education will be made. June was set as the month in which the athletic meet is to be held.

PATRIOTIC LEAGUE
HONORS RETURNED
NURSING SISTERS

ST. MARYS, Nov. 17.—Coinciding with the signing of the armistice, a reception was held in St. James' Hall, St. Marys, to honor two returned nursing sisters, Miss Ida Carr, who went overseas in the spring of 1915, and Mrs. Ione Miller, who went later.

Fourteen members of the McConnell Club, one of the financial supporters of the league, formed an arch with flags, under which the nurses passed up the main aisle of the hall, and on reaching the platform, little Miss Violet Black, who has three brothers in khaki, presented each nurse with a bouquet of chrysanthemums; while the audience waved flags and cheered enthusiastically.

Mrs. John Carr, mother of Miss Carr, and also honorary president of the league, was fittingly remembered with flowers presented by the president, Mrs. Butler, who made a very appropriate reference to the part mothers have taken in this world war.

Captain Carr, Mrs. Carr then read a passage of scripture and led in a short prayer. Mrs. Miller reviewed her work which was chiefly among the French soldiers in a very interesting manner, telling of the heroism and bravery of the boys. A diet by Misses Butler and Rae was much appreciated.

Miss Carr then spoke of her work, giving the domestic side of nursing—the gratefulness of the boys and their dependence on the nurses who are a real source of life and joy to them.

DISTINCTIVE RIBBON FOR
EARLY VETERANS OF WAR

Announcement will be made within a short time regarding a distinctive ribbon to be worn by all soldiers who served in France during 1914 and 1915. Other years of service will be indicated by another kind of ribbon, it is expected.

Many London soldiers will win the honor of having been among the early volunteers, including those who served with the 1st. Battalion, the 8th (later 12th) Battalion, and the 18th Battalion.

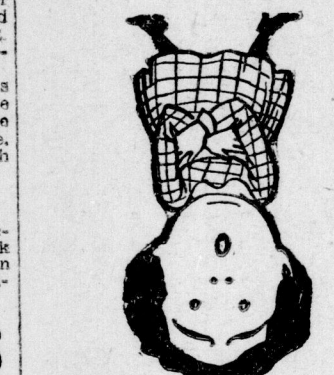
