FIREMEN STILL HOPEFUL THEY'LL BE CONSIDERED

Have Such a Good Case for Increase in Pay Aldermen May Make Exception for Them.

The city council will meet to-day to consider estimates. The great interest to many which in the past has been attached to this procedure is this year eliminated on account of the controllers' decision not to do anything with the recommendations for increases in salary for civic officials until the auditors appointed to make a special report have done their work. It has been said their report would be ready in three months, but expert opinion has it that end of the year will be nearer the mark.

While the auditors can be left to safely and properly deal with recommendations for office employees, others not in that class feel that they could very properly be dealt with now. This is especially true in the case of the fire department. While city hall departments have had a good deal to do at the civic treasury the reman have held back for three years. This year they felt sure that their case, on its merits would meet its due reward, and even a majority of the controllers and aldermen expressed sympathy and support for the increase of the firemen. The firemen are wondering if one of them can't muster up a bit of courage to say something in their behalf to-day.

"We're not asking any too much and we do feel that we are entitled to what we were led to expect we would get," said one of them last night. "We've a mass of figures making comparisons with the strength of the department and the salaries in United States cities. It's about the same size and you'd be surprised to know the difference there is. There are 236 men on our department or one to about 1200 citizens. Syracuse and Rochester, both smaller cities, average one fireman to about 800."

Our salary grading too is low. Take the first year man. He is offered \$450 a year. You can't get a decent laborer at that. Why I know two of our fellows, decent hard working fellows, and married, who can't maintain a home on that. They have to live with relatives. I think the aldermen might at least give the first year man \$5.50. Even then we are behind other cities. Why I know two of the first year men was getting \$400 a year. Mechanics and others can take advantage of life in the suburbs and secure cheap rent. They can go home to meals and be back at the station in an hour and a quarter. One man has arranged it by only going home twice a day and dividing his meal time in two instead of in three.

"The cost of living is higher every year and we can't be expected to stand still. We don't brag about our work, but last year we answered 1061 alarms. "We only want the public to get an idea of conditions here and elsewhere and I know we're not treated right. Every fire department of equal or greater size in the States has a list of officers and grades of active firemen, and shop employees as long as your arm. A chief at \$4000 is the average and then he has twice as many assistants as in Toronto, and his assistants are better provided for. As an example of the difference in cost of maintenance, Buffalo spends \$7000 a year on its fire alarm telegraph, while

IMPORTANT CONDITIONS IN STREET RAILWAY PLANS

Another Conference With Col. Gibson and Colleague—General News of the City.

HAMILTON, April 29.—(Special.)—The sub-committee of the civic conference committee had another conference this afternoon with Col. Gibson and W. C. Hawkins. The company said it would be willing to install a new street railway system with extensions in the city guaranteeing its bonds to the extent of \$500,000 if two important conditions were complied with.

What these conditions are the members of the sub-committee would not tell, claiming that it would be "showing disrespect" to the conference committee if the facts were given out before being reported to the committee to-morrow evening.

The entire garrison of Lisbon was on duty at daylight and formed along the route from the Nascentes Palace to the parliament buildings.

King Manuel proceeded to the Cortes accompanied by many dignitaries of state and escorted by a strong guard of troops. The floor of the chamber was filled with the deputies and the peers, while the galleries were crowded with a brilliant audience.

His majesty mounted slowly the tribune, and at the same time erected for his use a high desk, which he read in strong and full tones not unlike those of his father, was a pathetic, and at the same time a practical and vigorous discourse, calculated to win over the sympathies of the people. He touched upon the treaty of Feb. 1, when his father and his brother were shot down, with the utmost delicacy and tact, referring to the "cruel disappearance of my father."

Continuing, he called upon the country to concentrate all its energies in a supreme effort to attain the realization of the destinies of Portugal. "I hope to work with you," the king said, "in order to bring about the happiness and greatness of our country, and these I henceforth dedicate my life and activities."

Continuing King Manuel recommended a revision of the constitution, the re-establishment of individual rights, a new electoral law, fixing the method of suffrage, revision of the constitution, and more rigid and careful methods of finance, whereby the country could be placed on a more economical footing. At the conclusion of the king's speech the members of the Cortes broke out into cries of "Long Live the King," which were taken up and re-echoed by the others present as King Manuel and the state dignitaries took their departure for the palace.

While journeying to and from the buildings of parliament, King Manuel was respectfully greeted by the people.

Amount Arbitrators Award Robt. Davies Against C. N. R.

The board of arbitration have awarded Robert Davies \$30,000 in his claim for land damages against the C.N.R. for passing thru Thorncroft Farm, in the Don valley, a distance of about one-half a mile. The board consisted of Messrs. Silverthorne, John T. Small and Judge Morgan.

Awards in the claims made by the Emily Taylor estate and by Mrs. Davies have yet to be made. The board of railway commissioners at Ottawa yesterday approved the plan of the C.N.R. to expropriate certain lands along the park drive in the Don valley for railway yards, and the diversion of the highway, according to agreement with the city.

The agreement states that landowners are entitled to a voice in the new location, and if by reason of any change in such location, the company is unable to obtain a conveyance of lands covered by its agreement with the city, it necessarily follows that the present agreement fails.
