Candidates Galore After Lacrosse Honors.

ELECTIONS ON GOOD FRIDAY

Jackson, Craig and Lennox Not After the Presidency.

Old War Horse Hartley Will Oppose Vance's Re-election to the Secretaryship.

The annual meeting of the Canadian Lacrosse Association will be held at the Rosina House in this city on Good Friday, April 16, commencing at 2 o'clock.

The meeting will be held in the morning at 10 o'clock to prepare for the convention. All proposed amendments to the rules and constitution should be in the hands of the secretary, Mr. James Vance, of Ingersoll, not later than April 8, so that they may be mailed to the various clubs at least one week before the date of the meeting.

The attention of clubs is called to article 10, sec. 2, of the constitution, which provides that no delegate shall be admitted to the convention unless he shall have filed a certificate of his membership in and appointment by the club which he represents, signed by two officers of the club, and in case there is no such certificate, the delegate must be introduced by a member of the club.

The meeting promises to be a lively one. There are already three candidates in the field for the presidency, namely: Mr. E. Jackson of Toronto, J. J. Craig of Port Hope and T. Herbert Lennox of the City and County of Toronto.

Mr. Jackson is being generally well supported, but has the best backing in the West. Mr. Craig is being supported by the Ontario and Huron Districts, and Mr. Lennox is being supported by the Northern, Eastern and Toronto Districts.

For the vice-presidencies the names of E. A. Doolittle of Grimsby, J. D. Bailey of Toronto and T. R. Givens of Mt. Forest are mentioned, but there will no doubt be others.

For the secretaryship the present secretary, Mr. James Vance of Ingersoll, will seek re-election and it is said that he will be opposed by Mr. W. S. A. Hartley of the Toronto District. Mr. Vance is developing considerable strength and will receive good support in the York and North Eastern Districts.
