RECEIPTS WERE LIGHT BUT TRADE WAS ACTIVE

High Prices of Monday for Cattle Were Not Reached on Yesterday's Market.

FEEDERS WERE SCARCE

All Offerings Were Readily Bought Up at Firm Quotations.

Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards on Tuesday were 47 carloads, 799 cattle, 578 hogs, 28 sheep and 138 calves.

Receipts in all classes of live stock were light, trade was active, everything being cleaned up by 10 a.m. at prices not very means lower than on Monday. The high prices of Monday for cattle were not reached, but the quality was not there to bring them. The highest price paid was \$9.80 for a straight load of steers, 1200 lbs. each, bought by McDonald and Halligan, from Sam Hisey, on order.

Several lots and a few loads reached \$9 and \$9.50, common to considered, cattle values in all classes were strong at Monday's quotations. Bulls and cows in some instances were very warm at \$4, higher values were paid.

Stocks and feeders—these classes were scarce, and all offerings were readily bought up at firm quotations, some choice steers, 900 to 950 lbs., selling from \$8.50 to \$9.50. Milkers and springers—few of these were on hand, a few at \$8.50 to \$9.50.

Veal calves—Only 133 were reported on sale, which was not enough to supply the demand, which caused the values to be from \$10 to \$12 per cwt. higher.

Sheep and lambs—Only a handful, 28 of these were reported, and of course prices for them were very low, as every day the scarcity of sheep and lambs is helping to keep the prices of calves up higher than they otherwise would be.

Hogs—Only about 600 were offered and prices were firm. Packers reported having paid \$11.50, weighed off cars.
