THE N. B. HOCKEY LEAGUE MEETS AT ROYAL TONIGHT.

St. John, Fredericton, Moncton, Sackville and Sussex to be Represented—The Outlook is For an Active and Very Interesting Season.

The meeting of the New Brunswick Hockey League tonight should be a very interesting one. The president, L. D. Chipman, arrived in the city yesterday, and will meet the delegates of the various clubs at the Royal Hotel, at 8 o'clock.

There will be six teams represented, the same number as usual. Marysville, which has amalgamated with the Fredericton team, and St. Stephen, which is unable to play, on account of not being able to make satisfactory arrangements with the rink management, there will not be in the league this year.

However, Moncton and Sussex are going to have strong teams, and it is expected will give a good account of themselves.

The delegates from the Trojans at Fredericton are Chas. Allen, secretary of the league, and Chauncey Coleman. A. M. Hannah will be one of the delegates from Moncton. J. D. McKenna from Sussex. The representatives of Sackville could not be learned, but Herbert Wood is mentioned as one of the delegates.

The Mohawks will be represented by W. Rising, (capt.), and K. Ingersoll. The Neptunes will have Geo. Bizzard and H. D. Forbes to look after their interests.

There will be a number of questions brought up at the meeting relating to laws and rules of the league. We quote the following clipping from the Fredericton Gleaser, which should receive the attention of the members.

ST. DAVID'S CHURCH.
Will be Opened Again Next Sunday, After Extensive Repairs.

The members of St. David's Presbyterian church will worship in their own edifice on Sunday next, when Rev. Prof. Magill of Pine Hill College, Halifax, will conduct the services. This building has been closed since the first of June, while repairs were being made.

The work was in charge of Architect Brodie, and has been carried out in a very creditable manner. A new addition of sixtieth has been added, extending the whole width of the building. This includes, rooms for the minister and choir, an addition of sixteen feet to the length of the parlor and choir rooms for the Sunday school, and a sub-basement for the boiler and coal storage. The platform space is very much greater than formerly, the choir loft which is immediately behind the pulpit being 23 x 16 feet. The organ will be placed in an alcove at the south end of the platform, 15x20 feet, with opening in the end wall for the pipes.

The additional room in the auditorium has provided for six new pews in the main aisle and four on each of the side aisles making 175 more seats in all. The church will now seat a thousand or more persons.

The steam heating has been so arranged that part of the building may be heated as desired. Electric lights have been installed throughout. It is expected that Rev. Angus A. Graham, of Petrolia, the new minister, will be here in time to conduct the services the first Sunday in January. Rev. Prof. Magill, who will be here next Sunday, is considered one of the finest pulpit orators in Canada.
