British Nearer to Kut-El-Amara

London, Jan. 29-A British official communication issued this For Bread-and-Butter evening concerning the fighting on the Irak front in Asiatic Turkey LUNCHEONS

"As the result of operations Saturday night and Sunday we are now in complete possession of Turkish first and second lines southwest of Kut-el-Amara, on the right bank of the Tigris on a front of 4,300 yards. We also hold the enemy's third and fourth lines on

a frontage of 600 yards. 'Turkish dead to the number of 950 already have been counted and collected. More remain to be counted. Prisoners aggregating 127 were taken, together with one gun, one maxim, three trench mortars and a quantity of other material.
