Bouts For Welsh.
Ex-Champion Ad Wolgast is trying to get the first crack at Champion Freddie Welsh, and he is evidently backed by some Denver promoters. He offered to give Welsh \$15,000 guarantee to box him in Denver on Dec. 23. The champion, who is planning to get as big a bankroll as possible within the next six months, told Wolgast that besides being guaranteed the amount he wanted the privilege of taking 50 per cent of the receipts and 75 per cent of the moving picture money. Those amendments staggered Wolgast and he has to consult the Denver promoters.

The champion is also dicker with New Orleans promoters in regard to a bout with Mandot in January. He is trying to get the New Orleans promoters to raise their ante. Charlie White, who is the logical aspirant for the first fight against the champion, will have to wait until February at least before Welsh will meet him, if at all.

Chicago, Nov. 22.—On next Thursday Champion Freddie Welsh, or his manager, will have dangled before his eyes \$25,000 to sign a contract to fight Charley White twenty rounds in Denver about the middle of January.

The effort to get Welsh and White together over "the long way" is to be made by a Denver syndicate. The syndicate will offer Welsh, besides the \$25,000 an additional \$2,500 to be paid should he lose his title. Besides this, Welsh will receive a majority interest in moving picture rights or any revenue that might be produced in any other way from the battle. Whether the Boston will receive \$500 for training and traveling expenses will be fought out when the Denver promoters get here.

To Charlie White will be made a flat guarantee of \$5,000 and expenses or 50 per cent of the net profits or 20 per cent of the gross receipts.

If he wins the title he gets only \$1,000, the \$2,500 going to Welsh as heart balin.

McVey Outfought Langford.

New York, Nov. 23.—As the winter baseball meetings draw near the major league managers are beginning the usual trade talk.

Clark Griffith of the Washingtons has offered to sell First Baseman Chick Gandil to the White Sox or trade him even up for the heavy hitting Fournier. Griffith also says that he is willing to turn over Catcher Al Smith and Second Baseman Morgan to the Yankees if Donenat will make a fair proposition to him.

George Stallings, it is said, has received word from Herzog of the Reds that the latter will hand over Catcher Tom Clark for Pitcher Lefty Tyler. In Boston the critics say that Stallings will not keep Red Smith on the Braves' third base next year and will try to get another man during the winter.

Connie Mack is getting ready to trade the release of Frank Baker and it is reported that Comiskey still is eager to pay \$50,000 for the big slugger. The Red Sox meanwhile may attempt to land Baker as a trade for Larry Gardner.
