**NEARLY 17,000 MORE IN GOVERNMENT EMPLOY**

Matter of Conservative Appointments Given Further Airings—Hon. Mr. Graham's Stinging Speech

Ottawa, March 4.—Prof. Shortt's comment on political patronage evils, as exemplified in his recent remarks about 2,000 dismissals and about 10,000 appointments in three years under the present government, produced the most vigorous and illuminating debates of the session in the commonsense today.

Last week Hon. Robert Rogers declared that Prof. Shortt's criticism was "untrue, unfair, dishonest and dishonorable." Today Sir Wilfrid Laurier brought the matter up at the opening of the house and, maintaining that the comment from a minister of the crown on the man who was the guardian of honesty and effectiveness in appointments to the civil service, deserved either substantiation or withdrawal.

The government attempted to substantiate the criticism and fell into an unexpected trap. The excuse which one minister after another gave was that Prof. Shortt had neglected to refer to resignations or other withdrawals from the civil service, and had deliberately magnified the government's offence, crowding the pay rolls.

The reply came promptly. Mr. Sinclair (Quebec) pointed out that Prof. Shortt had very much understated the facts. Instead of there being only 10,000 appointments made during the three years there had been no fewer than 21,800. Dismissals totalled 3,937, and "resignations" 6,997. There was therefore an increase of nearly 11,000 in the number of government employees after giving the return the best face that the government could put on it. The moral as to the need of new taxes to meet extravagance was fully drawn.

Premier Borden, who spoke shortly before midnight, joined with the other ministers in lecturing Dr. Shortt, but declined to admit the suggestion of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, emphasized by W. F. Nickle, Conservative member for Kingston; Hon. Dr. Pugsley, E. M. MacDonald, and others that Prof. Shortt should either be allowed to vindicate himself or that an inquiry should be conducted.

ing the political tangle declared at the outbreak of the war by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, were hurled back at the government forces tonight with booming effect by Hon. George P. Graham.

"While you are crying 'true,' said he, 'you are standing us in the back by circulating the most inflammable campaign literature any party ever circulated. It is not enough for the Germans to fire on a flag of truce, but to take refuge under such a flag and then fire from that shelter on those who are acting in good faith is a far worse crime.'

"If you are determined to have an election, do not do as you did in October, and longer your cover on the back, and then draw back. Go about it in the open. We, however, intend to give you no excuse on the ground of 'legislation.' (Prolonged Liberal cheering.)

Doctor Townsend Speaks of the White Plague Battle

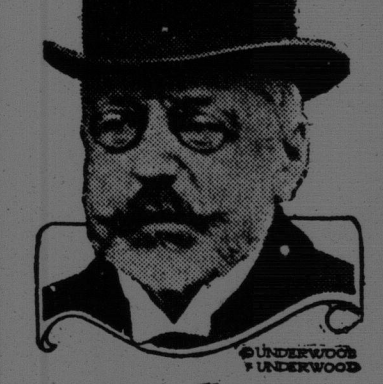
"We have depended on St. John for most of our patients in the past, but they are beginning to come in greater numbers from other parts of the province now," said Dr. David Townsend, superintendent of the Jordan Memorial sanatorium, yesterday. "As we send patients home cured or greatly improved they act, unconsciously, as missionaries in spreading the news of what the sanatorium can do and other patients from the same neighborhood will follow."

"We have been very much gratified by the success which has marked the work so far. The conditions have proved ideal in River Glade and we try to do our part. One of the features on which we lay emphasis is the diet and the meals served there will compare favorably with any first class hotel in quality, and cooking and perhaps surpass most of them in nourishment."

"No, the diet does not consist largely of milk and eggs as many people seem to expect. With a well rounded diet this is not necessary and the meals are designed to emphasize the fact that they are part of a hospital diet."

Townsend was here to hold the free clinic which is held in St. John on the afternoon of the first Thursday each month. This is open to any one without charge and as it is paid for by the government, it is not to be regarded as charity in any sense. The doctor wishes everyone who has any suspicion that he or she may be affected by tuberculosis to take advantage of the clinic as that is what he comes here for. It is held in the dispensary, in the water works building, corner of Leinster and Carmarthen streets.

**SCHOOL FOR MOTHERS**  
Mabel Potter Daggett Gives Facts Regarding Schools in England

(Quoted from Pictorial Review, March 1915)  
Some interesting statistics have been gathered by the Birmingham School. The average weight at one year of age for babies entered there in 1911 was 16.75 pounds. By the year 1913 the average for the babies registered had risen to 19.75 pounds. What the mother who had had first aid in turn to do for her baby was exhibited at the mothercraft competition in which thirty London schools engaged. Robbie Gordon was the best baby entered. There were also interesting class competitions. All the London newspapers commented on the extraordinary ingenuity shown in the sewing competition. The first prize went to a Fulham mother for a child's coat made from an old gray skirt. The material had been steamed and pressed. It was trimmed with "revived" green velvet from an old hat, and the lining was silk from a second-hand dress bought for twopenny at a jumble sale.

The cookery test was the preparation of a shilling dinner for a family of five. England's schools for mothers are doing very well. But this rearing of the children is not solely Mother's business, after all. Now the schools are cautious of reaching out for Father. There is room for improvement in his education. He is getting keen about that chart containing the baby's record that Mother keeps in the bureau drawer. And days when there is a baby clinic, often he hurries home from work to inquire eagerly what the baby weighs this week.

On the strength of this interest, Father's evenings have been begun at the Mothers' Schools. One has a Father's Bureau, which is announced as "a register for investigation, advice and recommendation." Gradually Father is developing a new sense of responsibility about his offspring. That cradle in which the Gordon baby sleeps before the open window, Jimmie Gordon himself made from a banana crate and lined it with muslin and fitted it with a mattress stuffed with bran, all at a cost of just eight pence. In the last mothercraft competition, a special class was arranged and fathers were offered a prize for "a contrivance for the benefit of mother or child, not to cost more than five shillings."

The first prize went to a fireman. He had made at a cost of one shilling a baby's ladder with a sloping zinc roof, a movable shelf, and a muslin cover for the milk jug. The second prize was awarded for a baby's chair made from a margarin box and a broom handle at a cost of twopenny.
