

Provincial Secretary Of Red Cross Always Busy With Many Activities

Miss Ethel Hazen Jarvis Specially Trained For Varied Experiences During the War Help In Present Position.

A BUSY Saint John lady is Miss Jarvis, secretary of the New Brunswick division of the Canadian Red Cross, around whom centres much of the activity of that energetic and active organization here.

Ethel Hazen Jarvis was appointed to the office of secretary of the Provincial Red Cross at the request of Lady Tilley in 1919. She succeeded Miss Elvyn Clements who had held that position with entire satisfaction to the Canadian Red Cross through the years of the Great War. Miss Jarvis was chosen because of her knowledge of the requirements of the position, a knowledge gained through her close association with the general work of the Red Cross during her secretaryship from 1914 to 1919 of the Women's Canadian Club of Saint John, when that society among its other outstanding war service took over the collection and care of the funds for New Brunswick prisoners of war under the direction of the late Mrs. Richard O'Brien and Miss Jarvis.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

In addition Miss Jarvis was at various times during these years, secretary of the Soldiers' Club, of the Convalescent Home and of the Soldiers' Comfort Association in Saint John, positions that brought her in touch with practically all the matters that led finally to the promulgating of the Peace Time Policy of the Red Cross.

Back of this training for a position that Miss Jarvis is filling with ever increasing ability, are several other factors that have aided her very materially in her office, and in the handling of the many, many problems that confront her daily, and that vary from a request to lecture on the policies of the Red Cross to that made by an eighty-year old man as to the best book on food values. These include the fact that she is descended on both sides of her family from United Empire Loyalists—the Jarvis and Leonard families—and has back of her a wealth of tradition connected with the early settlement of both the upper and lower provinces. Miss Jarvis is, too, a graduate of the Saint John High School and an active member of its alumni; an Associate in Arts of McGill College, and a teacher here for several years. MANY PROBLEMS

Miss Jarvis' interpretation of the work of the Red Cross and her recognition of it as the greatest mother in the world involves her in many problems that are less open-hearted, less charitable than the work of the Red Cross. It is a member of the provincial office and daily she hears tales of distress, of sickness, of needs that are patiently investigated for relief. This of itself makes a heavy demand on the time and heart and mind of the secretary. And always with her are the branches that extend all over the province and that are sustained and encouraged by a constant communication with the depot in Saint John. There is a tradition in the office that Miss Jarvis draws inspiration from the little socks, dainty blue and pink and white affairs, that she picks up and knits not only when striving to untangle some knotty problem but while traveling about the province in the interest of the Red Cross. If the babies for whom they are designed only knew all that has been knitted into this gift!

DICK TALMADGE ON UNIQUE SCREEN

King Pin of Stunt Men Performs in Thrilling Picture, Jimmie's Millions.

Filled with chases, the flying leaps, the burlesque, the dives, the fights and the sensational acrobatic stunts which have made him so popular, Richard Talmadge's new picture, "Jimmie's Millions," marks a new chapter in the production of this type of movie entertainment in that the story does more than provide a vehicle for stunt stuff.
