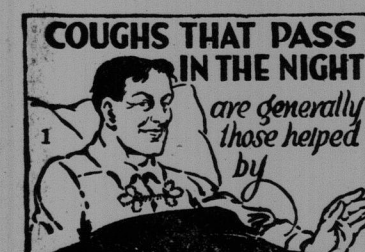


COUNTY WILL HAVE TWO PUBLIC HEALTH NURSES, COUNCIL DECIDES

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system on the Manawagonish road, the estimated cost of which was \$8,800; Charles Mason was appointed the chief of Districts 1 and 2, Lancaster, and W. A. Ross was appointed deputy county secretary at a salary of \$600 for the year 1924.

On motion of Councillor O'Brien, Daniel McAfee was appointed a constable for special duty at Pleasant Point.

Health Officer Accepted.

A communication from Hon. Dr. Roberts, Minister of Health, Mr. Councillor Simpson with the offer of the Rockefeller Foundation to pay the salary and expenses of two public health nurses in the county for the period of two years on the understanding that the municipality would carry on the work at the expiration of that period, was read and it was moved by Councillor O'Brien that the offer be accepted. This was seconded by Councillor Campbell and passed.

On motion of Councillor O'Brien the county treasurer was given power to place sums of money collected in Lancaster for purely parish purposes, payable wholly by the parish, on deposit in a savings account in the Fairville branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia.

Simonds Members Clash.

The proceedings at the Municipal Council last evening were enlivened by a tilt between the councillors from the Parish of Simonds in the course of which Councillor Dalsell accused his colleagues of opposing him because two or three of a delegation present had them on a string. This was hotly resented by Councillor Simpson, who denied and inflamed the chairman poured oil on the troubled waters and peace was restored.

Councillor Dalsell had introduced a resolution that a petition from several residents of East St. John to move Belgrave Avenue extended to Spruce street and Edith Avenue be complied with and the sum of \$2,650 be paid for the land required, this sum to be assessed on school district No. 8 in the Parish of Simonds in 1924 and 1925, as follows: To W. F. Burditt, \$700; the Hastings estate, \$600; Mrs. F. Curran, \$400; and James Ross \$450. Councillor Dalsell explained that this petition had been sent to him as a road supervisor and read a section of

the Road Act under which the duties of the road supervisor in such matters were outlined.

Strings on Them, He Says.

Councillor O'Brien moved, seconded by Councillor Bowland, that the matter be referred to the three councillors for the Parish of Simonds, to bring in a written report on the conditions before any money was spent. He asked King Kelly, K. C., county secretary to read section 9 of the Road Act, which said that no member of the County Council should be a road supervisor.

Councillor Wigmore thought the matter was too important for the Council to decide off hand and he contended the whole matter was out of order as the procedure outlined in the Act had not been carried out. Councillor Dalsell said there were certain little things back of the delegation's coming to the Council and his two colleagues were opposed to him on this matter because two or three persons had strings on them.

Councillor Simpson objected to this and demanded that the objectionable remark be withdrawn.

Councillor Dalsell started to give the history of some meetings of the East St. John Community Club and this was objected to by Councillor Wigmore who contended that the Council was no place for the councillors to wash their dirty linen and the acting warden ruled the debate out of order.

The motion to refer the matter to the three councillors for Simonds was then put and carried by a vote of 14 to 6.

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DEVELOPMENT OF PETICODIAC URGED

Moncton Board of Trade Hears of Project That Will Cost Millions.

Moncton, Jan. 16.—At last night's meeting of the Board of Trade, Mr. J. W. Fraser, chairman of the advertising committee, stated that the biggest difficulty in attracting outside concerns to Moncton would be found in the pessimistic attitude adopted by many of the citizens themselves. He suggested that an effort be made to create a spirit of optimism for their city among the inhabitants. From the advertising standpoint the committee was preparing data, he said, also getting out maps and pamphlets etc.

Along the line creating inducements for manufacturers to locate in Moncton, Matthew Lodge advocated the scheme of development of the water power of the Peticodiac River.

The scheme of harnessing the river had been drawn up by an eminent engineer, Mr. Turnbull, and his scheme had been favorably commented on by practical English engineers. The scheme when drawn up was estimated to cost \$11,000,000. But would now cost about \$15,000,000. Mr. Lodge suggested the government back the issue of bonds to do the work, and said he believed that data could be produced to show that the interest on the bonds could be paid in 5 years time.

A Rock Bottom.

The fact that there was a rock bottom to the bed of the river as the place where such a plant would be most advantageously placed, made this proposition a practical one. As to customers there was already in the railway a very large customer and when the power was available there would be lots of demand for it from incoming manufacturers. To illustrate this, one had but to consider the case of Hamilton, Ontario, a city of 90,000 before beyond power came, but which soon grew to a population of over 100,000. "Get the power and you get the customers," he said.

Several communications were noted among them being one from the Board of Trade requesting co-operation in the campaign for reduction of taxation. The work was also being done by the Board of Trade.

A recent offer of Dr. J. C. Webster, of Sheldale, to address the board on the tourist situation from the standpoint of trade, was accepted.

ROCKEFELLER AID FOR MIRAMICHI

To Provide Nurses — Red Cross Thanked by Council of Northumberland

Newcastle, Jan. 16.—The sessions of the Municipal Council were largely given up to routine work today. The secretary-treasurer's report showed that the valuation of the county for assessment purposes outside of the towns of Newcastle and Chatham last year was \$3,027,770, divided as follows: Real estate, \$2,126,725; personal, \$482,170; income, \$70,875; non-residents' real estate, \$370,200. Assessments for 1923 were: Schools, \$22,000; almshouses, \$8,150; Board of Health, \$6,000; contingencies, \$32,000; total, \$68,150. Receipts from all sources were \$116,198.45; county deficit, \$107,867.90; credit balance, \$8,830.93. The balance sheet shows: Assets, \$110,122.25; liabilities, \$112,472.98; county deficit, \$2,350.73; bonded indebtedness, \$93,600, of which \$30,000 is in six per cent bonds and \$63,600 is in one-half per cent bonds.

Dr. F. J. Desmond, of the Board of Health, presented the requisition for the board of \$5,000 and gave a statement of the Board of Health of the county and told the council that the Rockefeller Institute would pay the cost of two districts nurses for each county for two years, providing that the council would assume responsibility after that.

asking the council to assume responsibility for a patient they were now supporting at River Glade was heard and the council took over the responsibility, after thanking the Red Cross for their generosity and good work.

Resolutions were passed requesting the local government to repair the road from Ecclesville village to the light house and also urging the Canadian National Railways to place the "Whooper" train on the former timetable, at least two days each week.

The secretary said that the finances were in better shape than for the last five years. The county was now paying running expenses, paid interest coupons increased including fund \$10,000 and paid off \$10,000 worth of county bonds.

NO ACTION ON GAME PRESERVE

Charlotte Co. Council Lays Subject on Table—Dr. Anglin Speaks

St. Andrews, Jan. 16.—That the Charlotte county council does not regard with favor the projected game preserve in southern New Brunswick was indicated today when it was voted to lay on the table the entire subject. The council had listened to a strong plea in behalf of the preserve by Leonard B. Knight. The council resumed its sessions today at 10 a. m. The warden vacated the chair in order that the council could take up parish matters. Dr. J. V. Anglin, superintendent of the Provincial Hospital for the treatment of nervous diseases, addressed the council in the afternoon on the unnecessary burden of the insane. On invitation the Women's Canadian Club appeared in a body to hear Dr. Anglin.

Dr. Wade, medical health officer, also addressed the council on the subject of the appointment of county nurses to follow up the work of school inspection.

Accountant P. Blanchet in his report on the condition of the late secretary-treasurer's accounts, found that they were in splendid condition, and a high compliment was paid to the late official. The audit was satisfactory as heretofore.
