Mrs. Eaton's Recipe

Mrs. Elizabeth Eaton, Wolfville, won the First Prize of \$30 in our recent contest with the following recipe for Fillets of Halibut with Spaghetti:

Brush fillets of halibut (haddock, cod, or other white fish) with melted butter, dust with flour, season with salt and pepper. Place in buttered pan, cover with milk mixed with small quantity anchovy sauce, and bake in hot oven 20 to 30 minutes with cover of buttered paper.

Boil some spaghetti in milk and water, drain and place with melted butter in hot saucepan, seasoning with salt and pepper.

Remove fillets and bring remaining milk to boil, adding teaspoon each of fine chopped tarragon and parsley, with yolk of raw egg beaten in two tablespoonfuls of cream. Stir sauce till thick and pour over fillets which have been placed on spaghetti in hot saucepan.

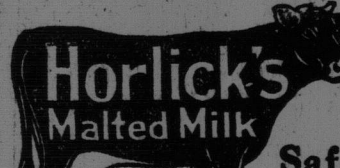
