Simard, chairman of the Quebec liquor commission, announced yesterday that customs officials had been notified not to accept shipments of liquor in bond or to allow them to be re-shipped. As a result, 600 cases billed from Toronto to St. John through Quebec were intercepted by officers of the commission on Monday. Many other shipments have been seized, mostly for St. John.

## CRITICAL DAY IN FRENCH CABINET

Premier Criticized re Alliance with England.

Germany to be Permitted to Share in Great Reconstruction Project, but She Must Pay What She Owes on Reparations.

(Canadian Press Cable).  
Cannes, Jan. 11.—While the Allied supreme council met today to consider Germany's war reparations, much of the interest of the delegates was centered in Paris where the French cabinet was to hold a special session to consider "France's" position. The result of the decisions reached here thus far. It is understood that considerable adverse criticism of Premier Briand has developed in his cabinet in connection with the proposed Anglo-French defensive alliance, and there is much speculation as to the result of the cabinet's meeting. Council approval of the plan for formation of an international financial corporation led the reparations question as the most important item remaining on the agenda. Conferences with the German representatives were expected to be short.

No delays will be accorded for the purpose of conferring with Berlin, and the German government is expected to accept the terms of the reparations plan. The desire of Germany to participate in the consortium which is being to emerge in the gigantic enterprise of restoring Europe, including Austria and Russia, to normal conditions, is being used to overcome any hesitation they might have to subscribe to the allies' new terms.

Although not named with Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium, Japan and the U. S. as a participant in the proposition for setting up the "central international corporation," the new institution will be called, Germany was specifically named as an important factor in central-eastern Europe that ought to help lift Europe out of her present troubles.

What She Must Pay.  
The final terms for reparations payments that the German delegation will be asked to accept are 720,000,000 gold marks and reparations in kind to the value of 1,760,000,000 gold marks annually.

France, finally renouncing any part of the one billion marks already paid, will get 1,120,000,000 marks of the payment in kind each year, the remainder as follows:—240,000,000 to Italy, 100,000,000 to Great Britain, 145,000,000 to Belgium, 7,000,000 to Japan. The rest goes to other beneficiaries under the treaty.

Of the 720,000,000 gold marks payable in cash in 1922, Great Britain will get 150,000,000, of which she will loan 250,000,000 to France, the loan being repayable from later cash payments by Germany to France. The rest will apply to Belgium's priority.

This division applies only to the present year, the idea being that the payments in cash be in part applied to payments of interest on series A. of the German bonds to the value of one billion gold marks now in the hands of the reparations commission to secure payment of 219,000,000 marks to Belgium, 450,000,000 to Great Britain and 31,000,000 to Italy.

The steamer Maskinonge was recently sold in England for \$1,000,000 to Russian purchasers. The steamer was 2,672 tons register, and was owned by the Maskinonge Steamship Company, Limited. She was under charter by the Dominion Coal Company until recently, and is well known in this port, as she has been here many times with coal from Sydney. She crossed the Atlantic late in the fall and was sold last month.

The rum-carrying steamer Harbinger is still at Eastport, as she is minus a Canadian captain to take her the rest of the way to Nassau, where her cargo is consigned. One of her crew was locked up on Saturday afternoon to await further identification by the officers in charge of the case. She was released by the Customs authorities on Friday.
