BEIGOS IS IN HANDS OF THE NATIONALISTS

Place Ten Miles from Constantinople Hold on Under Bombardment from British Fleet—Threat That Brussa Will Be Destroyed—Turks in Defiant Attitude.

London, July 6.—Turkish nationalist troops on Monday occupied Beigos, on the Asiatic shore of the Bosphorus, about ten miles from Constantinople, and opposite the Allied headquarters on the European side, according to a despatch to the Mail from Constantinople.

Constantinople, July 6.—Bombardment of the Great Mosque at Brusa and destruction of the town by airplane attacks are threatened in an ultimatum received by the governor of Brusa from Vice-Admiral DeRobeck, British high commissioner at Constantinople, who has been in charge of British landing parties along the Sea of Marmara.

Constantinople, July 6.—Greek troops have swept the country west of Beigos, clear of Turks as far north as Adramiti. They also have landed large forces at Chalkidiki and Thessalonica.

Constantinople, July 6.—Greek troops have advanced so rapidly and unexpectedly that the Turks were unable to destroy the railway, which with its rolling stock was left intact.

Constantinople, July 6.—Hubert Coulure, aged fifty-five years, of St. John's, Quebec, widower with nine children, Alfred Mouchon, aged fifty years, of Ierville, Que., father of a large family, and Arthur Paquet, of St. John's, unmarried, were crushed under the weight of 15,000 bricks.

London, July 6.—The Prince of Wales, emerged unscathed and smiling through the window of an overturned car when his train was wrecked yesterday, says a despatch from Perth, Australia, to the London Times.

The accident occurred near Bridgetown, according to the report. The prince's parlor car and one adjoining, which were late on the train, were derailed, dinged for 200 yards and then overturned.

Some members of the prince's staff received bruises of a slight nature.

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San Francisco, July 6.—James M. Cox, governor of Ohio, was nominated as candidate for the presidency of the United States in the democratic national convention at twenty minutes to two this morning.

When the ballots on the forty-fourth vote had reached a point where Cox had five votes and was rapidly approaching the necessary two-thirds of 729, Samuel B. Amidon, of Kansas, manager of the McAdoo forces, announced that the platform and moved that the nomination of Governor Cox be made unanimous.

Immediately there was a roar from the floor and worn delegates, which lasted for a full four minutes before Chairman Robinson could put the question on Amidon's motion to suspend the rules and nominate Cox by acclamation.

On the first ballot of the evening session the slide to Cox started and before the leaders of the opposition could realize it the votes were flooding over in his favor.

The coming development was obvious to the platform, secured recognition from Chairman Robinson. Everybody knew Cox was nominated several minutes before the motion was put.
