BASEBALL

Toronto in New Circuit.
New York, Oct. 22.—Speculating on outcome of the present "baseball" in the majors, Joe Villa, in The New York Sun today, says: "If the White Sox, Killies and Red Sox should be merged with the Cubs and Braves, respectively, John and his five club owners would have formed a new league. They would be entitled to interest outside capital in Chicago, Boston and this city. For the time being it has been hinted that there is a possibility of a new league in Chicago and New York and the high cost of building material might block the same here."

"Toronto, however, is ready to jump to a major league circuit. The Canadian city has outgrown its place in the north, and in case of emergency the members of the International League club would join hands with the Union combine."

ATHLETIC

Canada and the Olympics.
Montreal, Oct. 22.—Determination to give Montreal and Canada as a whole better representation in track and field competitions at the Olympic games was discussed at a meeting of representatives of local athletic organizations last night. Steps were taken to launch a provincial and nationwide movement to encourage development of athletes to compete successfully with those of other countries.

CONNIE MACK PRAISES JOHNSON
Manager of Philadelphia Athletics Comes Out in Defense of American League President.
Philadelphia, Oct. 21.—Connie Mack, half owner of the Philadelphia American League Club, said the other day it was not clear to him just what the meeting of baseball men in Chicago was attempting. The five clubs not represented at the meeting constitute a majority of the American League, he said. "We are the American League," he added, "and when the time comes the American League will meet at the call of its president and no doubt will take action that will help baseball; that will help raise its standard and prevent scandals in the future."

"I am not sure," Mr. Mack said, "that some of the National League clubs represented at the meeting do not need a housecleaning. No one in or out of baseball can point a finger at the five American League clubs that were not represented. They are all clean; not one of them has ever caused any trouble. The club that came nearest doing it was our own in the Perry case. When we knew we were right and threatened to take the decision of the National Commission into court we were urged by Mr. Comiskey of the Chicago club not to do it."

"I stood up in our meeting and said if it were the judgment of the members of the League not to press the matter, so as not to hurt the game, I bowed to their will and did nothing. And yet to their will and did nothing."

The American League has no objection to the National League's effort to do something to uplift the game. We will join them in anything that will raise the standard of baseball. The National League seems to send out the impression that everything is harmonious within its organization. I don't know whether this is true, but I do know there is harmony in the clubs of the American League, and we are not going to meet until we know what's what, and when we take action we will make no mistake."

THREE GIANTS ARE RELEASED

Roster of New York Club Being Reduced — Derrill Pratt and the Yankees.

(New York Times.)
The roster of the New York Giants was reduced yesterday by the release of three young players to minor league clubs. Outfielder Bob Kinsella was released to the Indianapolis club of the American Association under an optional agreement. Infielder Alfred J. White was released under option to the Oakland club of the Pacific Coast League, and Outfielder Emmons J. Bowen was released outright to the Toledo American Association club.

All three players were with the New York club at San Antonio last Spring and later they were sent to the Rochester club of the International League, where they played during the season. They were among the players recalled by the Giants late in the season. Their release now to other clubs is taken as an indication that the working agreement between the Giants and the Rochester club will not be continued for another year.

Although Derrill Pratt played a much better game during 1920 than during any of his previous seasons as a Yankee the announcement of the veteran's release through major league baseball does not appear to be causing any uneasiness at the headquarters of the Yankees. Pratt could be used to advantage, no doubt, if he saw fit to return to the club, but if he desires to quit the game, he may not have to turn down any big offer to make good his retirement plan.

An answer to the feeling that seems to prevail in the presence of the Yankee squad of Chick Fewster, whom Pratt decided to give all his attention to coaching collegians, Fewster will have his opportunity and while he may not be able to shine in his first year of regular duty as Pratt did during the 1920 campaign, it is not unlikely that he eventually will prove his worth in the minor.

Meanwhile the impression prevails that Pratt may be more anxious to remain in the majors when another season rolls around than he is at this time when he has the opportunity to accept a position as college coach at Michigan is fresh. There is no denying that the Yankees of 1921, but it is equally true that the club is especially well fortified against his loss at this time.
