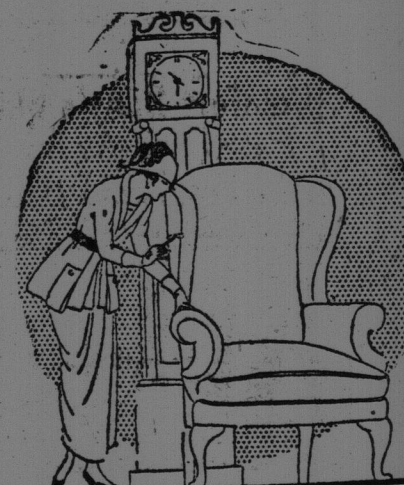

Fort William, Ont., Nov. 24.—The resignations of three members of the Board of Education took place owing to their disapproval of the inefficiency and procrastination of the majority of the Board in dealing with the salary schedule.

This was followed by the resignations of seventy women teachers of the Public School staff to take effect on January first, nineteen twenty-one, unless the Board reconsider the submitted salary schedule.

The citizens in general, the Board of Trade, Rotary Club, Women's Canadian Club and Business Women's Club have expressed themselves publicly in favor of proper and sufficient remuneration of teachers.
