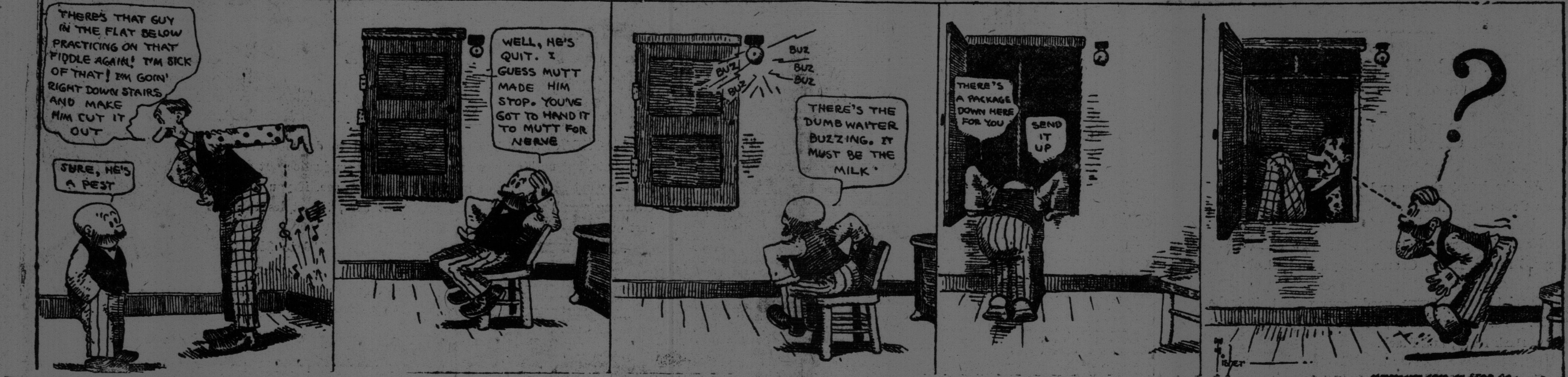

Connie Mack acknowledges it does not seem likely that Murphy will be able to play ball again.

The Break to Second. The New York club, the National League's entrants for the world's series, have stolen more bases this year than any other team in the senior organization and their followers expect that when they get into their important battles with the Red Sox, they will be able to steal many more on Carrigan and his associates on the Boston catching staff. The adherents of the Red Sox just as naturally figure that Carrigan, Cady, and others will be able to keep McEwen's speedy athletes from running wild on the paths. The figures show that when the Boston and New York clubs played a post season series in 1909 the New Yorkers stole eleven bases in five games and the Boston catchers threw out four men. Bill Carrigan worked in three of these contests and it was he who caught the four New York players.

In the American League this year the Boston's opponents have not been stealing with great frequency on Carrigan, Cady, Nunnemaker and Thomas. In the first five months of the season the Bostonians' adversaries stole 157 bases, Chicago getting 30, Washington 24, Philadelphia, 23, New York 22, Detroit 21, St. Louis 20, and Cleveland 17. While Boston's rivals were acquiring this number, 105 were caught in endeavoring to steal. They will go to Australia. Cincinnati, Ohio, Sept. 30—Twenty-three players representing the New York National League team and 22 of the Boston American League club, will battle for the world's baseball championship. 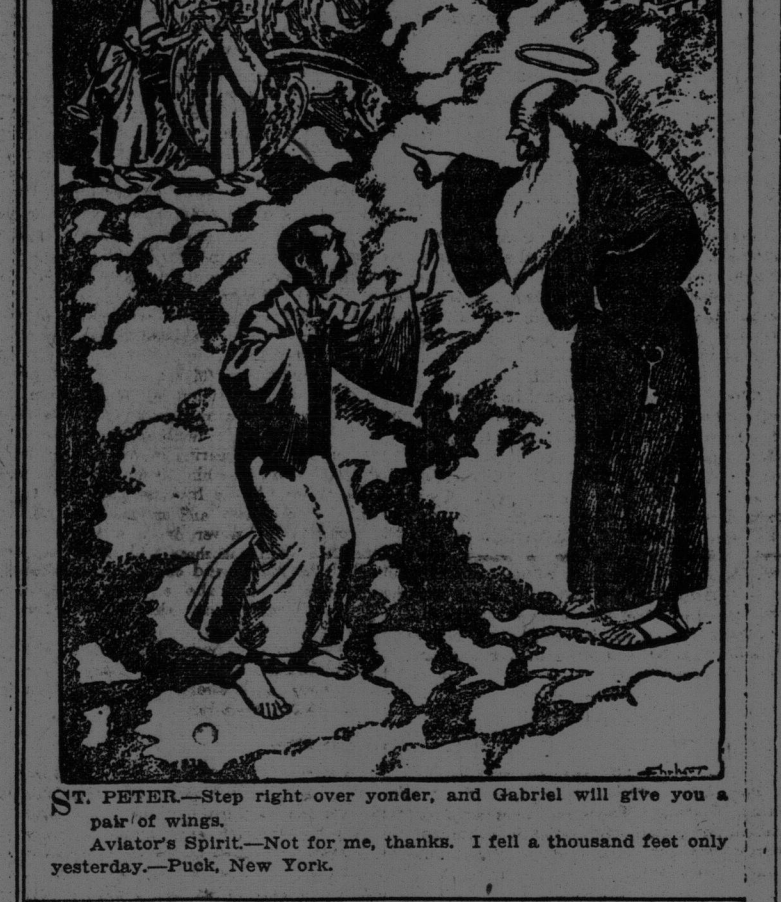

Gibson and testified that Mrs. Rose Menichil Sabro, with whose death Gibson is charged, died of strangulation by compression on the throat, and not of drowning.
