PAIR OF THESE SHOES WILL COST \$2,500
Latest Extravagance is Footwear Made of the Best Feathers of Humming Birds
London, May 31.—According to a Bond street purveyor of footwear, women's shoes made of the breast feathers of humming birds are the latest form of extravagance. They are valued at \$2,500 a pair, the highest price demanded for shoes with out diamonds or jeweled settings.
It is stated that a Paris shoemaker and that it takes six months to make a pair. Many humming birds are required to make one pair of shoes, as the tiny breasts must be stitched together to make a cloth of feathers. The effect is quite striking, the shoes gleaming with tones of red and gold mingled.
In this connection it is interesting to know that more money than ever is being paid for boots and shoes. One Bond street merchant said that bedroom slippers of silk brocade, trimmed with marabout feathers are quite the fad among the fastidious and bring about \$35 a pair. "I make a special box for each of my customers to ensure a perfect fit," he said, "and I do not accept a commission for fewer than ten pairs of shoes. With these are supplied six pairs of stockings to match each pair of shoes, making sixty pairs of stockings for a perfect fit. He also has a special box into which the whole can be fitted and taken on journeys without soiling the shoes. These are single pair of boots or shoes for new customers, as often I have to make several pairs experimentally before a perfect fit is obtained, and these, of course, are at my own expense."
This merchant says that an American woman has just ordered \$2,000 worth of silk stockings, for which sum she will receive 200 pairs. Costly stockings are much popular now that trim ankle peep from under the fashionable short walking skirt.

PLAN TO END OPIUM TRAFFIC IN SEVEN YEARS

Agreement Signed in Peking Means Extinction of the Business—Much Already Done
London, June 1.—The opium agreement, signed in Peking on May 8 by Sir John Jordan for England and the Wai-wu-pu for China, promises the certain extinction of the traffic within seven years. It starts out by recognizing the good faith with which China has endeavored since 1907 to reduce the production of the drug within the empire, and the first covenant is that for the next seven years it shall continue to be greater in 1910, 1913, and 1914. GUTS THEFT OUT OF YOUNG WOMAN'S BRAIN

Skull Operation Reforms California Girl Who Could Not Refrain From Stealing
That the surgeon's scalpel has carved her propensities for stealing from the brain of Jean Thurmer is the belief of Dr. Hubert N. Rowell, Chief of Police Volmer and others at Berkeley, Cal.
Jean Thurmer was operated on in Merritt hospital in Oakland on April 12 following her arrest for the third time in Berkeley on charges of theft. A small part of her skull was removed under the direction of Dr. Rowell. The young woman is firmly convinced that she is permanently cured of her desire to steal.
"Almost immediately after the operation said she 'I felt a great change. It seemed if something had been lifted from my mind. Always since I was a child I was more like a boy. I remember I was directed from the other girls. I loved the wild life of the cowboy and wanted to do things the men did. I don't know how the habit of theft took hold of me. I really didn't want to steal, but an irresistible something came over me and then I was sorry. But now I feel altogether different."
Dr. Rowell is extremely hopeful that the complete cure and declares that the results so far have justified all of the efforts in the woman's behalf.
"I feel sure that her future course of conduct will prove to the public that she was a case of disease rather than crime, said he. "A thorough revolution in the young woman's mind has taken place. Even her old acquaintances have noted a radical change in her manner, her tastes and her desires."

MELBA COULD NOT FINISH HER SPEECH

Prima Donna Found Herself "Two Nervous" and Address Was Read for Her
Madame Melba visited the Guildhall school of music, London, to inaugurate the scholarship of \$150 per annum open to soprano from all parts of the country, which she has presented. The celebrated soprano was received by the principal, London Ronald, the chairman, R. J. Pakenham and other members of the music committee of the city corporation.
Mr. Ronald, who was formally Madame Melba's accompanist, told the audience which packed the school theatre, his first met the prima donna at Covent Garden 17 years ago, when he had to do every thing except dust the chairs and accept the floor.
Madame Melba was unable to deliver more than a few lines of her address. After one or two vain efforts to continue, she said, "I'm too nervous. I have never made a speech before, and I can't do it now."
After the cheers had subsided the speech was continued by Mr. Ronald in the course of it Madame Melba expressed the opinion that of all the contributory arts singing was, in English, the Cinderella of the family. The speech concluded:
"If you wish to sing your native language beautifully—and you all should—you must love your native language and the people who speak it. Let me urge you to love it. Aim high. Let your ambition be to be a Shakespeare. Let your mind be Shakespeare's, your heart be Shakespeare's, your soul be Shakespeare's. 'Ode to a Skylark.' Matthew Arnold's, 'Forsaken Merman.' Swinburne's 'Spring Song.' in 'Atalanta' and many other of the poetic masterpieces. In which your beautiful language is so rich. Let them be the delightful companions of what might otherwise be sometimes lonely hours; learn to speak them aloud with distinction and understanding, and so enable yourselves to bring to your singing the added glory of a perfect diction."
In presenting to Madame Melba a handsome silver rose-hoop Mr. Pakenham announced that she had chosen her birthday as the day on which the scholarship should be inaugurated.

FURTHER ATTACKS ON MONTREAL LIQUOR TRADE

Alliance Now Tries to Close Bars at 1 p. m. on Saturdays And to Effect Other Changes
Montreal, June 1.—More advanced and more drastic legislation than ever for the curtailment of the liquor trade is at present being given the attention of the local officials of the Dominion Alliance. The object of the proposed legislation is to close all bars at 1 o'clock on Saturdays, and to effect other changes.
The first intention is the enacting of a law forbidding the opening of a liquor store at a bar within 500 yards of any church, school-house, factory or mill.
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SULTAN NEEDS FRENCH TROOPS' PROTECTION

Paris, June 1.—(Canadian Press)—Mouli Hafid, Sultan of Morocco has, informed General Monnier, commander of the French column which relieved Fez, ten days ago, that he wants a permanent garrison of 5,000 French troops at the southern capital and another French force of 1,000 men at Mequinez, thirty-four miles from Fez.
Advises from Fez say there can be no question that the departure of the French column from Fez would be a signal for a revolutionary upheaval, and that the Sultan, not one European would remain in the capital.
