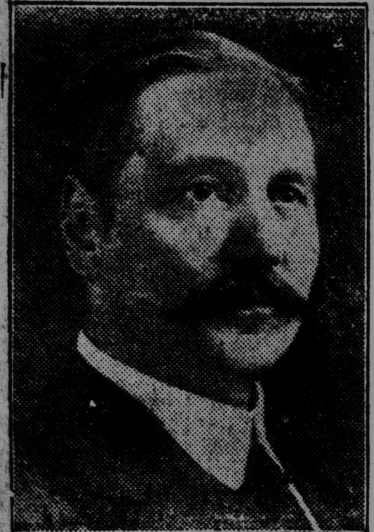

THE FAILURE AT LAUSANNE.

(Boston Herald.)

Though the allies led the Turk to Lausanne, they have not persuaded him to take the medicine they prescribed. Yet it was a mild dose and a comparatively sweet one, not at all the drastic remedy required to purge the Ottoman system of evil elements. There was nothing punitive in it, no

reaction of eye for eye or tooth for tooth, and not so much as just reparation for years of tyranny, persecution, torture and massacre. All was being made easy for the Turk to get

Asiatic dominion, except Constantinople, European diplomacy was bound to slip down the inclined plane, yielding more and more to Turkish demands. The cession of eastern Thrace as the price of peace was a humiliating performance, and utterly unavailing. Having received much, Turkey called for more. The Ankara Government set its face against civilization, and demanded untrammelled power of misgovernment to an extent that no Constantinople government ever possessed. Is the judiciary of Turkey to have citizens of other countries at its mercy? No country will answer in the affirmative. The courts of other Asiatic nations, the courts of Japan and China, may be trusted to give intelligent and fair decisions, but not the Turkish courts with their Moslem laws affecting "infidels." Yet Ankara has not only declared against the former consular courts, but has refused to admit foreign legal advisers to the Turkish courts when the cases of foreigners are on trial. This irreconcilable attitude on almost every question has wrecked the conference. We are rather glad that "oil" was not the cause, Britain and Turkey having agreed to attempt a settlement of the Mosul question themselves within a year, and hand it over to the League of Nations if they fail. But that is a small thing compared with the treaty of peace that has been lost in the making. A world very weary of war cannot but deeply regret the termination of the armistice of Mudania. Its period has automatically expired with the conference, leaving a state of war between Turkey and Greece, and also between Turkey and the allies. Will there be actual war? Keep an eye on Moscow and the Caucasus.

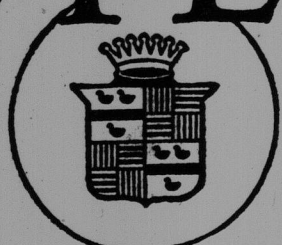

SERGEY P. SEMENOV
SLAIN BY NEIGHBORS
AS "BLACK MAGICIAN"

Russian Who Was Friend of Tolstoy,
Blamed for Every Misadventure in Village,
Shot Down on Country Road.

Sergey P. Semenov, Russian national writer and close friend of the late Count Leo Tolstoy, has been murdered by fellow villagers who believed him responsible for their misfortunes, according to a letter received here yesterday by Herman Bernstein, author and journalist.

Semenov's neighbors were suspicious of him for some time, the letter said. They would say: "He is forever writing. But what is the use of his writings? If he is an educated man let him go to the city. He may bring misfortune upon us."

Then, whatever misfortune befell

the villagers, whether in the fields or their home life, was ascribed to the "accursed black magic of Semenov."

He got the name of "Sorcerer."

The letter continues: "If a cow died suddenly or a wagon broke down, the whole village would start whispering: 'That is the sorcerer's evil eye.'"

"One day recently Semenov was on his way to the neighboring village of Butovo. He was carrying a manuscript to make his neighbor copy it for him. Gregory Malutin, his son Nicholas and his daughter Vera, Semenov's fellow villagers, were hiding in a clump of bushes at the bridge approach.

"Where are you going?" shouted Malutin to Semenov.

"To the teacher with a manuscript," he answered.

"Well, this is your last manuscript,"

"two shots were fired. Semenov fell dead."

"At the investigation the Malutins declared, calmly: 'Yes, we killed the sorcerer. Is that a sin? He brought harm to our cattle. He brought illness to the village with his evil eye. The drought was due to him. He was to blame for the famine.'"

"It was like the voice of the middle ages at the trial of witches. Poor Russia!"

Semenov, although he had attained fame as a writer, never would leave his village, preferring to remain there and to till the soil as well as write. He was recognized years ago by Count Tolstoy, who wrote an introduction to some of Semenov's works. The book that had gained him his widest popularity was his autobiography entitled: "Twenty-five Years in a Village."

NEW HOTEL CODE SOUNDS
DOOM OF SKIMPY SHEET

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 14.—A whole code of new sanitary regulations for Iowa hotels and restaurants is proposed in bills introduced in the lower house of the Iowa Legislature by Representative Yenter. Under these measures hotels would be required to provide 36-inch sheets, could not force patrons to sleep on straw mattresses, couldn't have quilts on the beds, couldn't use cracked dishes in the dining rooms and would be forced to provide at least 400 cubic feet of air space for each person sleeping in its bedrooms. Cooks would be prohibited from smoking in restaurant kitchens, and cats could not be allowed inside.

SUBSTITUTES BUDGET

FOR FAIRS AND BAZAARS

TO SUPPORT CHURCH

Augusta, Me., Feb. 14.—Abandon-

ment of all fairs, bazaars, concerts, sup-

pers and similar ways of raising money

for St. Mary's Catholic Church of this

city, and in their place a carefully

distributed budget which will equi-

libly distribute the church's support

upon the parishioners, was announced

last Sunday at all masses by the Rev.

Father Joseph R. McGowan.

The budget in brief calls for in-

crease of every adult member of the

parish. A case of fifty-two envelopes

will be sent to each parishioner, one

for each week in the year, with the

request that returns be made every

week. The plan will be inaugurated Sunday,

Feb. 18. It has been estimated that a

yearly fund of between \$15,000 and

\$20,000 will be realized.

Growing dissatisfaction of the mem-

bers of the parish regarding the vari-

ous entertainments, particularly the

annual bazaar, led the pastor, the Rev.

Father Thomas J. McLaughlin, and

the curate, Father McGowan, to evolve
