SUPERANNUATION BILL BEFORE HOUSE

Will Cost \$1,435,000 a Year
—Measure Given First
Reading.

Ottawa, May 21.—First reading of a bill providing for the superannuation of civil servants, was given in the House of Commons today. The resolution on which the bill is based states that it is "a measure to provide for the superannuation of civil servants; to provide for contributions by civil servants to the consolidated revenue fund to civil servants and to the widows and children of deceased civil servants of superannuation allowances or gratuities."

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, asked what would be the annual cost to the country or the average cost for the first five years and the anticipated cost for the second five.

Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, explained that the cost to new entrants would be 5 per cent of the payroll. The civil servants would pay 5 per cent and the Government 5 per cent, so it was impossible to determine exactly what the cost would be without knowing how many civil servants would transfer.

He estimated that if all transferred, the cost to the Government would be about \$1,435,000 a year.

Mr. Meighen—"That \$1,435,000 must be 5 per cent of the present civil service salary total?"

Mr. Robb—"I imagine so."

Mr. Robb understood that the other schemes would be merged with the proposed one. It would be a matter for the civil servants themselves to consider. He understood that civil servants were willing that all the funds should be merged.

Sir Henry Drayton asked if military superannuation, as distinct from military pensions would be brought under the new scheme. Mr. Robb did not think so.

CANNIBAL'S HEAD, IN MUSEUM HERE

The latest gift received by the Natural History Society came from the New Hebrides, the islands in the Pacific Ocean lying northeast of Australia. It is the most gruesome exhibit that the society possesses, being the preserved skull and face of one of the cannibal inhabitants of these islands, a very unpleasant looking war trophy that was greatly prized by its one-time owner. The cover of the box containing the head is now usually kept closed, as the cannibal is not a comfortable associate in the museum office.

The gift was presented by Miss Dorothy King, 188 Charlotte street. It was sent to the city by a missionary and came from Mallicolo, the largest island in the New Hebrides group. The natives of the islands belong to the Polynesian race.

Beside the trophy from the New Hebrides, the other latest gift received by the society appears a very peaceful and usual article. This gift is a basket of split reeds made in the West Indies. It came from Trinidad. This basket is an exceptionally good example of the native work of Trinidad and has been presented to the society by Miss E. M. Wesley. Two colors of reeds are used in the basket, which is square in shape with a deep square cover which slips down over the sides as far as may be wished.

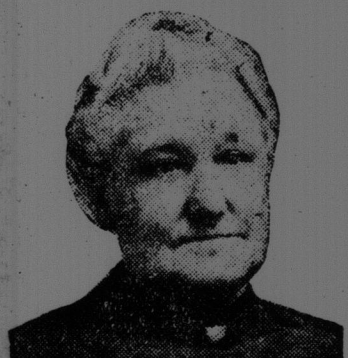
Bert Cox, of Fairville, C.P.R. brakeman is reported improved, after a serious illness at the General Public Hospital.
