CITY CLEAN-UP URGED BY SOCIAL SERVICE COUNCIL

Speaker Avers Haunts of
Vice Are Known to Civic
Authorities

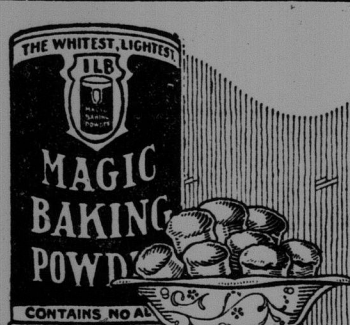
DR. SHEARER ATTACKS
GAMBLING IN CANADA

Executive to Send Delegation
to Fredericton on Mothers'
Pensions Matter.

A general clean-up of the vice
haunts in the city was strongly
advocated last evening at a meeting
held in the Church of England
Institute under the auspices of
the Social Service Council. During
the evening Rev. H. A. Goodwin
declared that there were many
houses of ill-repute operating
continuously in the city although
known to the police and higher
civil authorities. He also said
that gambling houses were running,
liquor was being sold under
government connivance, and dance
halls were being used as the
resorts of crooks and bad women.
He urged the need of good men
at the head of the departments
to bring about a general clean-up.

Rev. Dr. Shearer spoke on the
activities of the Social Service
Council of Canada. He outlined
the growing use of narcotics
which was getting a grip on
many people in Canada. He also
said that the white slave traffic
was not entirely confined to
Montreal as a statement made at

said that gambling was one of
Canada's national vices and pointed
out that in all \$250,000,000 were
wagered on horse racing during the
last four years.

The meeting was not largely
attended. Rev. Neil MacLauchlan
presided.

Executive Meets.
At a meeting of the executive of
the N. B. Social Service Council in
the afternoon a delegation was
appointed

to wait on the Provincial Government
and urge the passing of legislation
for mothers' allowance, for the
establishing of a training school for
the mentally deficient and for the
compulsory treatment of drug
addicts. The delegation will also
commend the Government for
preparing a draft act for the
care of children born out of wedlock
and for moving towards the
establishing of an inter-provincial
prison farm.

C. O. McGivern, who recently
resigned. Rev. Dr. Shearer reported
the formation of two new branches,
one at Woodstock and the other at
St. Stephen.

for the guests.

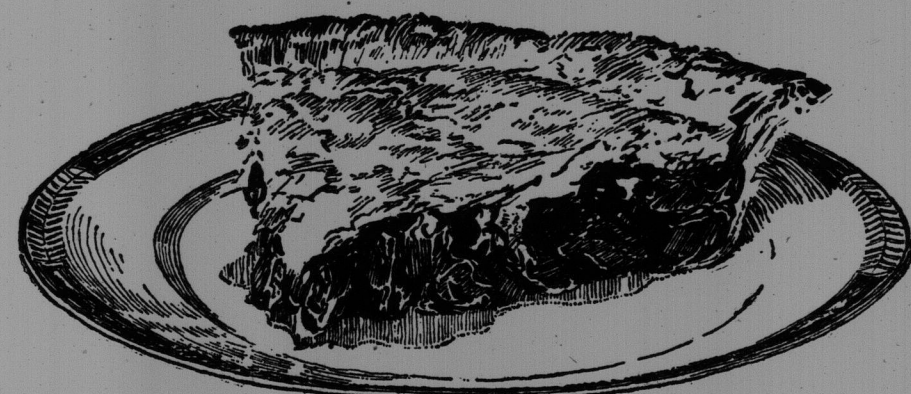
