### Relax Blockade, Hoover's Advice

Off to Europe to Help Feed Starving

MILLIONS AND MORE MILLIONS

Says Anarchy Must Be Put Down and Stable Government in Enemy States Set Up and "Famine is the Mother of Anarchy."

New York, Nov. 16.—The problem of feeding Germany is not one of going to their relief, but of relaxing the blockade, so that they may secure for themselves the bare necessities that will give stable government," said Herbert M. Hoover, food administrator, before sailing for Europe today to discuss food measures for the relief of starving populations.

In a formal statement on the food problems to be met in Europe, Mr. Hoover, laid emphasis on the necessity of lifting the blockade so that the German people can help themselves. The statement in part follows:

"Our first and deepest concern now must be for the little allies who were under the German yoke, they are the Poles, Serbians, Roumanians, Greeks, Czechs, Jugoslavs and others. There are

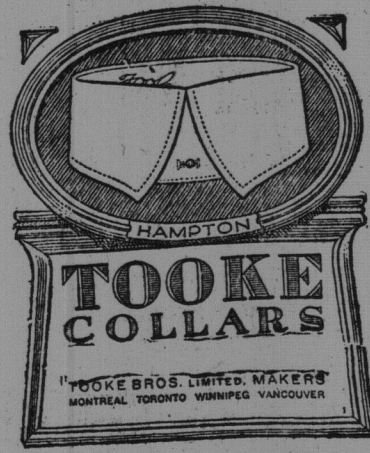

After a brief address by Rev. Dr. J. A. Morrison the window was unveiled by Robert P. Cowan, brother of the late James E. Cowan.

He is survived by his wife, one daughter, and a son serving with the Canadian Army in France. His body will be sent to Canada for burial.

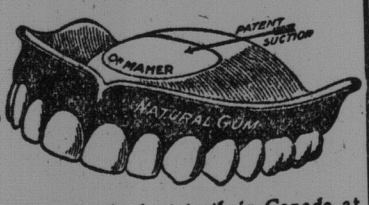

## The Casualties

Mrs. William Dooley of 68 Sheriff street, has received word that her husband, Private Dooley, was killed in action on September 28. He enlisted with the 28th Battalion. Besides his wife he leaves two small children.

Mr. and Mrs. James T. Henderson, of 104 Duke street, West St. John, have received word that their son, Dr. Alexander Henderson, is seriously ill with broncho-pneumonia at No. 7 Canadian General Hospital. He went overseas with the first contingent.

Cecil Garnett, of 42 Albert street, has received word that his brother, Pte. John Garnett, was wounded, November 3, and was admitted to a hospital. He went overseas with the 118th Battalion.

Pte. R. Leslie Smith, son of Captain Norman Smith, of Yarmouth, was killed in action, according to news received here over the week end. He was formerly employed with the firm of Wm. Thomson & Company.

Mrs. George Barnes, of Passesage, has received a cable announcing that her husband was wounded in the left shoulder on November 1. Private Barnes, who is twenty-four years old, went over with a forestry battalion last autumn. He was in Scotland with his battalion all winter and then asked for and got a transfer into the infantry in the early summer and has been in France for three months. A brother, Otty Barnes, sleeps in "Flanders Fields," having made the supreme sacrifice some time ago. His friends will hope Private Barnes' wounds will not prove serious.

Pte. G. McLean Killed.

Newcastle, Nov. 16.—Mrs. Clifford Payne, of Boom Road, has been notified of the death of her son, Private Guy McLean, in action on November 1. His father was the late John McLean, of Boom Road. The soldier was about twenty-two years of age. He enlisted at Redbank in the 148th Battalion, and was later transferred to the 165th. He went to France last spring. He was a fine young man for whom many mourn. He leaves his mother and several brothers and sisters.

## CONVENTION OPENS TUESDAY

The United Baptist convention of the maritime provinces was to have been held in Woodstock beginning October 19, but owing to the ban on public meetings due to the epidemic this date had to be abandoned. Later it was considered wise to give up for this year the idea of a general convention and to summon boards and committees, with such pastors and delegates as found it convenient to attend, to meet at a central place for the consideration of reports and the transaction of necessary business.
