WINNIPEG SEEKS POWER TO REGULATE THE SMOKE NUISANCE.

TO CLOSE THE BARS

Forty-Nine Municipalities Vote For Local Option.

IT AFFECTS 131 LICENSES

Lost in Six Townships and Four Towns or Villages—143,341 People Are Concerned in the New Local Option Centres—List of the Municipalities in Which Local Option Was Adopted Last Monday.

Toronto, Jan. 3.—Latest returns of the vote on local option in this province on Monday shows the significant fact that 49 municipalities have adopted the principle which, if carried out, will cancel 131 licenses. The proportion of the rural population voting on Monday was about 8 per cent. in favor of no license, and the population of these new local option centres is 143,341. The following table shows the population of the municipalities to hand, the results of Monday's vote and the number of licenses at present in each one:

PRESIDENT M'CALL.

Pays to New York Life \$235,000 Hamilton Failed to Account For.

New York, Jan. 3.—John A. McCall, president of the New York Life Insurance Co., has paid to the company the \$235,000 advanced to Andrew Hamilton, and so far not accounted for by Mr. Hamilton. On receipt of Mr. McCall's letter, accompanying the cheque and note, a meeting of the board of trustees was called for to-day.

While no official statement on the subject is obtainable, it was accepted as a fact that Mr. McCall's resignation as president will be presented to the trustees to-day.

At a conference of a number of trustees yesterday Alexander E. Orr was requested to accept the presidency of the company. Mr. Orr said he would prefer that some one else be selected for the place permanently, but he offered to act as president until some one else is selected.

Cleveland is a \$12,000 Referee. New York, Jan. 3.—An agreement to abolish rebating on premiums has been entered into by the New York Life Insurance, the Equitable Life Assurance Society and the Mutual Life Insurance Co. Announcement was made yesterday that Grover Cleveland has been appointed referee to decide all questions in dispute that may arise in such matters, and that his salary as referee will be \$12,000 per annum, to be paid jointly by the three companies. Mr. Cleveland has accepted with the understanding that the officers of the three companies are to second him in his efforts to stop rebating.

Steamer Manitoba Lost a Life-Boat. St. John, N. B., Jan. 3.—The C. P. R. steamer Lake Manitoba and the Allan liner Siollan arrived here yesterday after a terrific voyage across the Atlantic. Seas swept the decks of both ships day after day, and the Manitoba lost a life-boat. Both brought a large number of immigrants for Western Canada, mostly English-speaking.

Latimer Fights Law. Calgary, Alta., Jan. 3.—W. H. Latimer, the Philadelphia fugitive, was turned over to the Montreal police officer at noon yesterday but a habeas corpus writ was secured from Chief Justice Writ and the prisoner again released. One thousand dollar bonds were given by two business men. The hearing will occur Friday.

Blake Again Nominated. London, Jan. 3.—Edward Blake has again been nominated by the Nationalists of South London. He is now in Toronto. If he accepts, he will now be the youngest, as in the past two elections.

The Ingersoll intermediates made a most creditable showing in the big rink at Stratford last night in their initial game of the season. They were defeated by a score of 9 to 6 but in view of the fact that they have had no practice their admirers are well pleased with the result. 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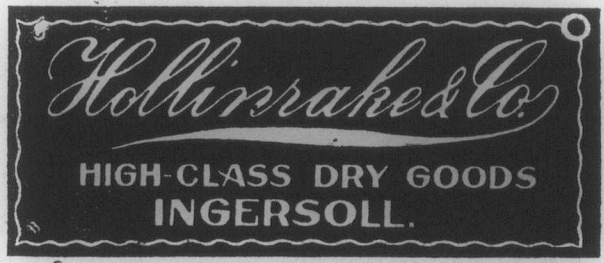
