Sheets of Flame. RIVERS OF BURNING OIL RUNNING DOWN THE RAVINES AT PARKER CITY, PA. A special despatch to the Philadelphia Times from Parker City, Pa., says:--For three days Parker has been in a state of great excitement. Since daybreak on Thursday morning, when the great 20,000 barrel tank of oil was set on fire by the lightning, fire has been raging incessantly. When the tank burst, streams of flame ran down the ravine. Several houses in Kellyville were destroyed, and when the oil reached the river the flames leaped upward for three or four hundred feet. The sight was a grand one, but no one thought of that. Parker City was in danger. Happily, however, the fire was stayed in that direction, although the work of destruction along the oil well went on.

The first tank destroyed belonged to the William Minshall Company, of Pittsburgh. Later in the day a seven thousand barrel tank, owned by the Graham Oil Company, was destroyed. Early yesterday morning a third tank was fired. This was the immense tank owned by Chaffin & Robinson, of Kittanning. It held 20,000 barrels of oil, and was situated in the deep ravine opposite the Oil Exchange. The flames were partially smothered, but again broke out, and then

WITH AN AWFUL REPORT the top blew off and the fire raged fiercely in the tank. The excitement throughout last night was intense. Everybody waited for the end to come. When the oil should boil over it was expected to fire a tank containing 10,000 barrels in the direct line which the burning oil running down the ravine would take. The flames were expected to cross the river. The lower portion of Parker was in danger. People moved their goods to places of safety. The firemen were ready at a moment's notice. No one slept last night. No one could, with danger so near at hand. A certain hope was held, but no one dared to expect it. All that could be done was to watch and wait. At 11, 15 to-day.

THE OIL OVERFLOWED, but not so heavily as was looked for. A solid sheet of flame ran down the ravine to the river. Great clouds of black smoke rose into the air. The heat was most intense. It penetrated gas in the United Pipe Line Tank No. 76, known as the Grape, Weller & Co's tank, situated three hundred feet north. A most terrific explosion followed, shattering the heavy plate glass in the windows and stove of the city, and shaking the houses to their very foundations. The explosion was heard for ten miles. The roof of the tank was scattered around the country for a long distance. One piece, weighing fifty pounds, was found four miles away. The scene that followed was appalling. The tank contained 22,000 barrels and the explosion did it level with the ground.

SOLID WAVES OF BURNING OIL rushed down the hillside. They reached the river but did not stop there. For a while the commotion was complete. Everyone looked for the flames to strike directly across and fire the city. The anxiety was intense. Everything depended upon the current and the mildty the scene at this time was beyond description. The river of burning oil, with its flames and black smoke, rolled its folds upward until the heavens were darkened. The citizens, terror-stricken, rushed in wild dismay in all directions. Their faces were blanched. Women and children were crying and strong men were paralyzed with fear. Happily the wind was strong enough to change the course of the flames to below the city. In half an hour they began receding. Then they divided, hugging both banks of the river. The coming was overwhelming and sublime. The receding was a fitting finish to a picture that never has been transferred to canvas.

The Dead Lock in Quebec. [From the St. John Telegraph.] The extraordinary position assumed by the Legislative Council of Quebec in usurping the functions of the House of Assembly, and in the same vote, declaring their want of confidence in the Government, and refusing to pass the Supply Bill in exciting as much astonishment as indignation throughout Canada. To say that such a proceeding is unheard of in modern times, is to express but mildly the absurdity of the position which the Legislative Council has assumed, for there can be no doubt that the refusal to vote supplies in the upper branch of the Legislature is revolutionary. The Legislative Council of Quebec declares that it deems it its duty "to delay the adoption of the Supply Bill now before the House, until it shall have pleased His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, to choose advisers disposed to maintain his dignity." This means that the Government must dismiss the present Government and choose other advisers, and it means also that the Legislative Council of Quebec, which consists of twenty-four members, and that the Quebec Assembly, which consists of sixty-five members elected by the people and which represents the people, is to be

wholly disregarded in the administration of public affairs. This surely is a novel doctrine to be heard in the fourth quarter of the nineteenth century.

The Upper Houses of any Provincial Legislatures are sometimes likened to the House of Lords in England, although their powers and privileges are far inferior. But the Peers of England never attempted anything so bold as this coup in Quebec. In 1860 Lord Lyndhurst, indeed, claimed that the House of Lords had the right to reject a money bill, but it was clearly shown that the right, if it existed at all, had not been exercised since the Revolution of 1688. The question came up in 1860 when the House of Lords rejected the bill for the remission of the paper duties. This, although a very mild affair compared with the rejection of an entire supply bill, was held to involve a great constitutional question and to be an interference with the powers of the House of Commons. At that time the House of Commons passed three resolutions which were moved by Lord Palmerston, the first of which declared:--

That the right of granting aids and supplies to the Crown is in the Commons alone, as a constitutional part of their constitution and the limitation of all such grants, as to matter, manner, measure, and time, is only in them.

In the exercise of its undoubted power the House of Commons, a few days later, as the instance of Mr. Gladstone, passed a resolution remitting so much of the customs duty on paper as exceeded the excise duty. In the following year Mr. Gladstone compelled the Lords to accept the remission of the paper duties by the express of including all the chief financial propositions of the budget in one bill. The Lords did not dare to reject this bill and so the paper duties were repealed. But the Quebec Legislative Councilors are much bolder than the English House of Lords and arrogate to themselves much greater powers. They undertake not only to refuse the supplies necessary for the purpose of carrying on the business of the country, they threaten the Lieutenant-Governor with a continuance of this refusal unless he drives his present advisers from power. Could the force of usurpation and folly go farther?

Rev. Kalkoff. Candidate for Mayor of San Francisco and who was recently shot by one of the editors of the Chronicle of that city, is thus referred to by the Boston Post:--

Rev. Isaac S. Kalkoff is a native of Rockland, Me., his father having been a preacher in that city. When he was a young man he was sent to the Baptist College in Waterbury, Me., to study for the ministry. While at college the lady's passion led him into disgrace, and finally resulted in bringing about his expulsion. He returned to Rockland and managed to again get into the good graces of the people, and had begun to preach. People looked from town to town many miles of distance to his impassioned eloquence, he meantime keeping up a semblance of the most devout piety. For long, however, such discoveries of his sins were made that he was expelled in disgrace. Somehow he managed to suppress the wrath of interested parties, and the affair was for the time hushed up, and, in fact, was never known to any extent outside of his neighborhood in which it occurred. Young Kalkoff, thrown upon his own resources, came to Boston, and in some inexplicable manner secured letters of introduction and recommendation to prominent Baptist here. The Temple Church of that city offered him the vacant pulpit without inquiring into the facts attending his departure from Rockland. He was duly installed pastor, and gained great notoriety here as a sensational preacher. He was a rabid prohibitionist, and a warm advocate of the most radical reform. But he was detected in immoral practices when the exposure came, it was found that he had been in the habit of drinking large quantities of liquor, and was guilty of repeated acts of immorality. He was arraigned on a charge of adultery, tried, and no criminality could be proven to his testimony, the jury standing eight for acquittal and four for conviction. A certain class of his adherents, however, repeated efforts to secure political preferment, Kalkoff finally obtained the nomination for Congress on the Orange ticket, but the La Crosse Democrat published an expose of his career, and the aspirant's hopes were blighted in that section of the country. He then went to San Francisco and again became noted as a pulpit orator and a Republican politician. By some means he became popular with Kearney's party, and was nominated for Mayor of the city.

It seems that the Chronicle referred to Kalkoff's past history and claimed that he was morally unfit to be Mayor of San Francisco. Kalkoff retorted by denouncing the editors of the Chronicle and went so far as to say they were of illegitimate parentage. This is said to have been wholly untrue, and it is expostulated one of the brothers De Young that he called at Kalkoff's office and induced him to go upon the street where he shot him. The wounds inflicted were thought at first to be fatal, but it is believed Kalkoff will recover. De Young was arrested and placed in jail with him, as well as the Chronicle office, had to be guarded to prevent the mob from avenging Kalkoff's treatment. Kearney has told his followers to persevere in their efforts to obtain control of affairs in the city and when that is done De Young shall be duly hanged.
