TEMPLEMAN TAKES OVER ADMINISTRATION OF MINES

Bill for the Creation of a Department of Mines Will Be Introduced
at Next Session of Parliament — Pickford and Black Contract
Renewed — Grand Trunk Pacific Affairs — To Attend Funeral of
Late Walter Barwick



OTTAWA, July 18.—The administration of the geological branches and the mines has been transferred from Hon. Mr. Oliver, minister of the interior, to Hon. Mr. Templeman, minister of inland revenue, and the cabinet representative of the great mining province of British Columbia. The transfer has been made by order in council. It was understood, when Mr. Templeman was given a portfolio, last year, that British Columbia's importance would be further recognized by the creation of a department of mines of which the geological branch would form the basis and of which Mr. Templeman would be made the head. A government bill for the creation of the department of mines will be introduced at the next session, an act of parliament being required for the purpose. In the meantime it has been thought well to give Mr. Templeman the administration of the existing geological and mines branches that he may become familiar with the existing machinery and be in a better position to organize the mining department as soon as the necessary legislation has been secured. Among those who will attend the funeral of Walter Barwick, twelve days hence, are Canadian victims of the Salisbury rail-

way wreck, will be Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Hon. Rodolph Lemieux, and Dr. Coulter, deputy postmaster general. They left tonight for Toronto. Mr. Barwick was a law partner of Mr. Aylesworth. A disputed point in the location of the Grand Trunk Pacific has been settled. The road will cross the Saskatchewan River at Clover Bar, some miles from Edmonton, and proceed to that city along the western bank of the river. The people of Strathcona, which is directly across the river from Edmonton, have been pressing to have the line built to their town and to have the crossing made there. Dr. McIntyre, M. P. for Saskatchewan, today addressed the government, urging this. However, special surveys have been made under the direction of Engineer Schreiber of the railway department, and they show physical obstacles to making the crossing at Strathcona. The government has, therefore, agreed to the Clover Bar crossing. The government has renewed for four years from July 1, the contract for the Canadian-West Indian steamship service, with Pickford and Black of Halifax. There is to be a sailing every twelve days henceforth instead of every fourteen days, as in the past.

SOUTHERN REVOLUTIONISTS ARE TAKING A DAY OFF.

Guatemala and Salvador Waiting Till
Roosevelt Tells Them to Shake
Hands.

MEXICO CITY, July 17.—A number of minor chiefs of the Guatemalan revolution, who made an invasion of the northern portion of that republic, have arrived here and say all movements of the revolutionists in Guatemala are brought to a temporary standstill awaiting negotiations for peace between Salvador and Guatemala. The revolutionists allege cruelties, executions, forced loans and general despotism on the part of the Salvadoran government. Salvador, it is affirmed, will never consent to making terms with Cabrera, her bitter enemy. It is said that there is likely soon to be another revolutionary movement begun in Guatemala, supplementing the present one. Mexico continues her policy of strict observance of the neutrality. Officials here have received news that the Salvadoran army and revolutionists under command of Gen. Toledo, have the Guatemalan army surrounded at Jutiapa, and can compel their surrender as the Guatemalans have lost their artillery for twenty-eight guineas.

LONDON, July 17.—Arthur Drummond's "Bobs and the Baby," published in 1900 to illustrate a pretty but apocryphal incident in the South African war, was sold at Christie's yesterday for twenty-eight guineas.

NORWEGIAN STEAMER BUMPED A WARSHIP.

The Guernsey Was Considerably Damaged
and the Battleship Rhode Island
Had Some Plates Bent.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., July 17.—During a violent wind and rain storm which swept over the harbor here this afternoon about 6 o'clock the Norwegian turret steamship Guernsey dragged anchor and crashed, stern on, into the starboard side of the battleship Rhode Island, then at anchor off Chesapeake and Ohio pier No. 7. The battleship at once got under way and steamed further out into the harbor for another anchorage. Several plates on the side of the Rhode Island are said to have been slightly bent and a hole was stove in the side of the tramp. It has been impossible tonight to get an interview from her owners here and it is certain that she will have to be repaired before she goes to sea again. The Guernsey is commanded by Captain Gjertsen and is a vessel of 2,888 tons.

'GOSPEL OF UNIONISM'

A Strange Labor Meeting on a Chicago Street Corner.

CHICAGO, July 18.—Drums and flags drew a crowd of spectators last night to the strange labor union meeting held here in Chicago. Under an arc light at the corner of 9th street and Cottage Grove avenue, union leaders alternately preached the gospel of unionism, sang industrial songs, sang time, and collected contributions for the support of strikers, while a hundred or more onlookers marvelled at the new method of the Chicago Federation of Labor.

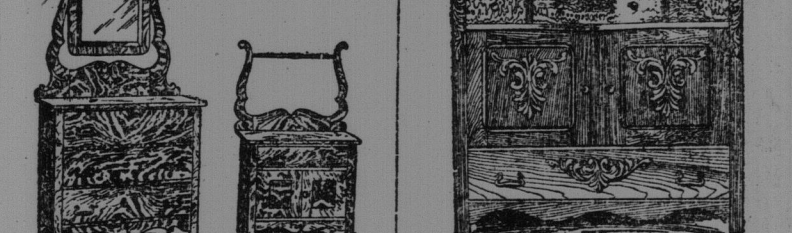
