Synopsis of Canadian North- west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of
a family, or any male over 18 years old,
may homestead a quarter-section of
available Dominion land in Manitoba,
Saskatchewan or Alberta. The appli-
cant must appear in person at the Do-
minion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency
for the district. Entry by proxy may
be made at any agency, on certain
conditions, by father, mother, son,
daughter, brother or sister of intend-
ing homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon
cultivation of the land in each of
three years. A homesteader may live
within nine miles of his homestead on
a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned
and occupied by him, or by his
father, mother, son, daughter, brother
or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in
good standing may, pre-empt a quar-
ter-section alongside his homestead.
Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must re-
side six months in each of six years
from date of homestead entry (includ-
ing the time required to earn home-
stead patent) and call rate fifty acres
extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted
his homestead right at 4 cannot obtain
a pre-emption right to a purchased
homestead in certain districts. Price
\$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside
six months in each of three years, cul-
tivate fifty acres and erect a house
worth \$20.00.

BRING RESULTS

TRYING HARD TO OUST KAY FROM OFFICE

MONCTON, Aug. 10.—At the after-
noon sitting of the commission in-
vestigating Magistrate Kay's conduct
the witnesses called were Nelson L.
Rand, master mechanic, I. C. R.; City
Clerk Magee, recalled; J. C. Sherran,
barrister; R. W. Hewson, A. N. Char-
ters, G. L. Harris, barristers and
County Secretary Gessner A. Taylor.
The main evidence offered was to show
the conduct of the magistrate in court,
in giving his decision turned on him
(Rand) and abused him. He considered
the magistrate attacked him un-
fairly without cause and tried to dis-
credit him in the eyes of the public
when the assault was most unprovoked.
He admitted Skiffington had sworn
that he (Rand) had applied an im-
proper term provoking the assault. He
felt strongly against the magistrate
and came to court to express his feel-
ings.

Mr. Rand told his case of assault
before Magistrate Kay, in which the
accused was Geo. Skiffington, ex-I. C. R.
detective. He said the magistrate
fined Skiffington twenty dollars, and
in giving his decision turned on him
(Rand) and abused him. He considered
the magistrate attacked him un-
fairly without cause and tried to dis-
credit him in the eyes of the public
when the assault was most unprovoked.
He admitted Skiffington had sworn
that he (Rand) had applied an im-
proper term provoking the assault. He
felt strongly against the magistrate
and came to court to express his feel-
ings.

County Secretary Taylor produced
cheques issued in favor of Jas. Kay as
magistrate of Moncton in connection
with criminal prosecutions.

By J. C. Sherran, an alteration be-
tween the magistrate and police clerk
which he heard from Kay and the mag-
istrate and others had alterations in
trying cases. On some occasions the
magistrate threatened to lock him up.

Always Got Along
R. W. Hewson said he had always
got along all right with the magistrate,
but was not much before the court.

Personally Kay had treated him fair-
ly. He described an altercation be-
tween the magistrate and police clerk
which he heard from Kay and the mag-
istrate and others had alterations in
trying cases. On some occasions the
magistrate threatened to lock him up.

A. N. Charters also gave his version
of the trouble between the magistrate
and police clerk, having overheard the
noise and going in to see what the
trouble was. He found the magistrate
and clerk in a heated discussion and
with the police clerk being mixed up in
it. He had heard the magistrate re-
mand parties engaged in cases.

G. L. Harris was examined in refer-
ence to the Black theft case, and Mrs.
Wallace Scott Case, two cases
which ran almost concurrently. He
did not think he was treated fairly by
the magistrate in these or other cases
to which he appeared for clients for
three or four years. He had refrained
from attending in the police court
because of the treatment received
from the magistrate.

Being cross-examined by Mr. Rus-
sell as to what he meant in a memorial,
by stating Magistrate Kay was incompe-
tent and unfair and that justice was
prevented in Moncton, Harris said he
considered Kay incompetent to weigh
evidence fairly and cited instances. In
this case was star witness against
Scott Case violation.

The inquiry will be continued tomor-
row morning.
