

THE EASTER SERVICES AT HARTLAND

Large Congregations in all Churches, and Special Sermons—Ice still Holds, but Break Expected Soon.

Hartland, N. B., April 13.—The ice still holds in the river here, although the hot sun on five days is wasting effect on it. The stream is rising with the melting snow, and it will not be many days before the river will be sufficiently swollen to cause a movement of the ice, which in its weakened condition will not be likely to do any damage.

The Windsor Hotel here has again changed hands last week. John Blair, the late proprietor, sold out the property to C. Craig, the former returning to his farm at Windsor. Under Mr. Craig's management, the house is doing a good business and the new proprietor seems well pleased with its venture.

The Easter service of the Church of England Sunday morning was one that will long be remembered by the large congregation present. The pastor, Rev. N. Franchette, fairly excelled himself on this occasion and his discourse was a masterly effort of research and plain speaking. Representatives of all denominations sat under a spell while the learned divine called upon witnesses one after another to prove that Christ had indeed risen and that the Christian above all others has had the surest foundation and the most perfect assurance of the authenticity of the resurrection of Christ. The preacher's efforts certainly created a profound impression on his hearers. In the afternoon he held services at Glassville and in the evening at Beaufort, driving a distance of about thirty miles to serve the members of his flock.

In the Methodist Church Sunday evening, Rev. P. A. Fitzpatrick spoke feelingly and with much force on the subject of Easter, and declared that from a profane point of view this was the greatest historical event in the history of the world. His address was listened to with rapt attention and the congregation was deeply impressed.

In the Baptist and Reformed Baptist Churches, the pastors delivered powerful sermons on the subject that occupied the attention of the church on Sunday. The music in each case was of a special and joyful character, and the pulpits were beautifully decorated with potted plants.

The Hartland Cement Block Co. has had its capital stock increased to \$40,000 and the company is going out after more business. KILLED IN BASEBALL GAME.
One of the first fatalities attributed to baseball in Brooklyn, this season, occurred Sunday when John Nelson, 18 years old, died at the home of his father, a builder at No. 652 Hicks St. Nelson made up one of two teams which played on Saturday afternoon in the open lot at the foot of Hicks street. During the game he was struck on the right side of the head by a thrown ball. He became unconscious but after being revived he resumed playing.

Yesterday he suddenly became unconscious and died while Dr. C. J. Noonan of No. 154 Henry street was trying to revive him.

The death of Thomas Abraham O'Brien, aged forty-seven years, occurred yesterday morning at his home in Brussels street. He is survived by one son, John, and one daughter, Mary, both at home, and by his mother, who resides at his former home in Syria.

SUPREME COURT OF APPEALS IN SESSION

Election Cases Before Court—Winding Up of the May Queen Steamship Company's Affairs.

Fredericton, April 14.—The Supreme Court of Appeal opened this morning. The full bench was present—Chief Justice McLeod, Judges White and Grimmer.

This being common motion day, Mr. T. J. Carter, K. C., moved for a rule nisi for a quo warranto in respect of Joseph Nadeau, to be directed to Richard Leung and David Albert, calling upon them to show cause why they claim to act as Councillors for the parish of Clair, county of Madawaska. Nadeau had been an unsuccessful candidate in the councillors' election, at which Leung and Albert had been declared elected by the casting vote of the returning officer, after a second count of ballots. Mr. Carter explained that eight or ten years ago, in the Brymer election case, he had secured a rule nisi under conditions similar to those in the present case. He claimed that fraud in counting would invalidate the return, if fraud could be proved, and also that even a mistake without fraud would void it. The Court considers.

Mr. P. J. Hughes moved for a writ of prohibition in an election appeal from the county of Restigouche in the case of John Kerr, Frank Lapointe, Matthew MacDonald and Wm. E. Fudge, all electors from Durham, protesting against Councillors John Leung and Archibald Murchie acting as councillors for that parish. The election took place in September last, and these applying for prohibition are the candidates who were declared elected, their protest being against a committee of the county councillors appointed for a review of election proceedings exercising any authority in this respect, one of their main grounds for prohibition being that proceedings were not taken promptly for the recount. Having once adjourned, it was claimed the committee could not afterwards take up the counting. The Court considers.

Mr. Hughes, acting for certain shareholders of the May Queen Steamship Co., Ltd., re the winding up of the company, applied for time to file notices and enter case. He read affidavits of G. H. Buys, who is a mortgage holder of the company's stock, and of D. Mullin, K. C. Time granted till Tuesday of next week, 21st inst.

In the matter of the application of Anne Mildred Albert, widow, for a writ of habeas corpus, the case stands over till June. Mr. C. Lionel Hamilton asked for leave to enter and demit case. Stands till tomorrow.

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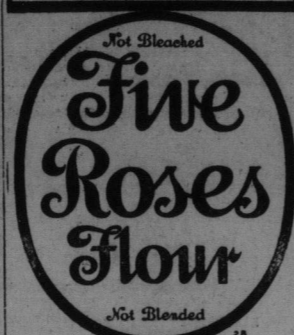
