## STEPS TAKEN TO PROVIDE TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL

### County Council Orders Preparation of Bill For Establishment of Institution—Plans For Extension of Lancaster Sewer System—Payment of Bills Authorized

The County Council at its meeting yesterday ordered the preparation of a bill to provide for the establishment of a tuberculosis hospital and another to provide for the extension of the Lancaster sewer system. The question of abolishing the morgue next year was considered and the building committee was instructed to report on the conditions under which local undertakers could be got to take charge of bodies. After a long discussion various bills were ordered paid.

Those present were: Couns. Golding, Bryant, Long, and Lancaster; Dean and Corcoran, Musquash; Carson, Shillington, Simonds; Smith, Black, Howard, St. Martin, Frink, Agar, Schofield, Wigmore and McEllan, St. John.

In the absence on account of illness of King Kelley, the auditor, I. Olive Thomas acted as secretary.

Coun. Smith submitted the report of the finance committee as follows:

J. D. Hayes, then Attorney-General of New Brunswick.

4.—Your committee do not recommend the payment of an account rendered by Murray W. Long for 50 days at \$4.00, notwithstanding the repairs to coal, registry office and court house amounting to \$200, but do recommend a fee of \$50 be allowed him for his services.

5.—Your committee recommend the payment to Frank McBratney of \$40, services as turnkey county gaol; but that in future no payments be made substitutes doing work of officials on holidays without leave of council.

The report was adopted.

Sent in Too Late.

Then the chairman of the finance committee read two bills handed in too late for the committee's meeting, one being a small bill from Mr. Bowman for ashes and materials for the gaol, and the other a bill of about \$900 for coal supplied the gaol by George Dick.

Coun. Frink objected to bills coming before council until they had passed the finance committee.

Coun. McEllan said Mr. Bowman's bill was for contract work and should be paid. As for the coal he would like to know whether it was delivered as per contract, and where it went to.

Hon. Black-Tenders were called for coal some time ago.

Mr. Olive—On June 21.

Coun. McEllan—By whose authority?

Mr. Thomas—The sheriff has authority to call for tenders for all gaol supplies. He has certified Mr. Dick's bill. The coal is for the winter's supply.

Coun. Frink said that in view of the explanation he thought it would be unfair to make a man wait for money

for goods supplied, and moved that the matter be referred to the finance committee with power to act. This was adopted.

Coun. McEllan submitted the following report of the building committee:

Your committee on county buildings beg leave to report that they met on the 30th ult, and are pleased to note that the repairs to the county gaol are progressing satisfactorily.

Your committee have favorably considered the discontinuance of the use of the morgue on King street East, in the city of St. John, and for the purpose of carrying out this recommendation advise that tenders be called for the care of bodies by public undertakers and that necessary rules and regulations be prepared by your committee on county buildings to enable the council to definitely decide this matter at the January meeting of the council next.

Want More Money.

The building committee asked that the appropriation of \$1,500 for repairs to the county gaol be increased to \$2,500. Coun. McEllan said the committee had expended \$900 out of the former appropriation, and that in addition to the balance on hand, an extra grant of \$1,000 would be needed. Some important work had to be done in connection with the fitting up of the registry office. An order to make the extra appropriation was passed.

Coun. Frink brought up the matter of establishing a tuberculosis hospital. He moved that the bills and by-laws be instructed to prepare a bill providing for the acquisition of the property on Chesley and Merritt streets, and the creation of a commission to erect and administer a hospital for tuberculous patients.

He said that the commissioners of the public hospital and the commissioners of the almshouse had agreed to take up the matter, and it was necessary to establish a new commission to manage the institution.

Coun. Schofield seconded the motion. He said there had been a good deal of criticism to the effect that somebody was blocking the movement. He thought the criticism was unfair, because the delay was due to the fact that there had been no governing body to proceed with the work. He felt every member of the council in sympathy with the movement.

The motion was adopted.

The Coal Bill.

The council went into the committee of the whole and Sheriff deForest was asked to explain how George Dick's bill for coal was incurred.

The sheriff said it was customary for him to call for tenders for coal for the gaol buildings and that in the prospect of coal increasing in price he had called for tenders last Sunday afternoon at the lowest.

After some discussion the former motion was reconsidered and it was decided to pay the bills of both Mr. Dick and Mr. Bowman.

Coun. Long moved that a bill be prepared authorizing the Parish of Lancaster to extend the system of the Asylum corner along Champlain, Prince, Duke, Winklow, Charles and Tower streets, the Lancaster and Tower streets, and the Avenue to Dufferin Row. This was adopted.

Coun. Shillington said the policeman of Simonds was boarding his horse at \$4.50 a week. The policeman could board the horse for \$2.75 if a floor was placed in said policeman's stable.

Coun. McEllan moved that the planning be provided, and this was adopted.

St. Martins Sidewalks.

Coun. Black wanted to know about \$450 for sidewalks in St. Martins. He said the bank there charged from 7 to 9 per cent.

Coun. Howard said they would want the amount charged against next year's assessment. The county could borrow for 5 per cent.

A motion to advance the money to St. Martins was adopted.

The assessment committee reported on a communication from the Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Company, Limited, respecting a claim of over assessment made in the Parish of Lancaster against their company.

It was resolved that in view of the information presented to the assessment committee that the Cushing Mill property, wharf, land, houses, etc., and also the property purchased from the Hon. William Pugsley, were not being used by the Edward Partington Pulp and Paper Company in the manufacture of wood pulp and paper at the time the assessment was made. The assessment committee requested the County Secretary to arrange a meeting between the Partington Company and the assessment committee previous to the next municipal council meeting.

This was approved, and the council adjourned.
