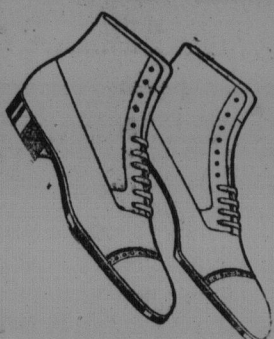

ST. JOHN RIVER RECORDS.

Ice said to have come from West Bay, above the Narrows, made its appearance in Indian Harbour yesterday. Steamer men think the river will not open before April 15. Records by P. Naso & Son show that the earliest opening of the river for 95 years occurred in 1902, when on March 23rd, the river was clear. The river remained open until November 29th, a total of 250 days, the longest season of navigation of which records are available.

The shortest season was in 1854, when the river opened up on May 7th and closed on November 10th, there being navigation for 203 days. The latest date of closing was in 1878, when freight was carried as late as December 18th.

Police Court

Cases Yesterday

George Axtell, Wm. J. Mulcahy and Allan Rankine—Were Sent up for Trial—Two Men Remanded for Drinking Lemon—Four Drunks Remanded.

In the police court yesterday morning the three lads charged with the theft of cloth from Hoffman Bros., Main Street, were sent up to face trial before the circuit court which will meet in a few days.

George Axtell and William J. Mulcahy were sent up on the charge of entering the barn of Murray Alexander on Murray Street and stealing a set of harness. Sarah Lemire of Chapel Street was the only witness called.

Allan Rankine concluded his evidence in the case of William Perry, charged with misappropriating funds of the T. Rankine & Sons Ltd., and the accused was sent up for trial on this charge and also on the charge of committing the same offence with the funds of C. H. Peters & Sons while in their employ, another charge, that of stealing a silk tie from the buffet in sample rooms is still being heard.

Joseph Hartley and John Keith were remanded on charge of drinking liquor in the Union Depot. C. N. R. policeman Ross gave evidence of the two drinking in the lavatory. Arthur Kennedy pleaded not guilty to having liquor in his possession, but guilty to being drunk. Policeman Hogg said he saw the accused pulling a cork out of a bottle of gin on an Alley off Main Street. The prisoner was remanded. Four men pleaded guilty to drunkenness and were remanded to jail.

L. N. Bickford

Died Yesterday

Was Vice-President of Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company—Identified With Several Large Enterprises—Has Many Friends Here.

News of the death of Llewellyn N. Bickford, formerly of Portland, Maine, but for many years a resident of New York, was received yesterday in St. John. Much regret was felt as Mr. Bickford, who was Vice-President of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company, had made many friends in this city on his visits here.

Mr. Bickford, as well as being Vice-President of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company, was Vice-President and managing director of a large number of pulp and paper concerns, including the Oxford Pulp and Paper Company of Rumford Falls, Maine. He was closely identified with several large enterprises of Hugh J. Chisholm. He was a man of high character and was warmly esteemed by his associates. Recently Mr. Bickford has been seeking health in Florida. His death took place in New York.

Paving Tenders Were Presented

Commissioner Fisher Presented His Report and Recommendations to Council and Matter Was Left Over Until Today.

At a committee meeting of the common council yesterday the paving tenders were presented by Commissioner Fisher and the matter was laid over for consideration this morning, when it is hoped that a draft of the proposed new abutters' tax bill will be available.

Commissioner Fisher's report and recommendations follow:

"Marsh Road Paving.—Received only one tender (\$43,700) complying with the specifications, and this was much too high for acceptance. Other regular tenders were also received, but did not meet with approval.

"(2) City Road Paving.—Lowest tender was from the Stephen Construction Company, \$123,070 for all granite blocks, or \$57,160 for granite in track section and asphalt on sides, all on cement foundation. Next tender was \$20,128 higher.

"(3) Douglas Avenue Paving.—Only two complete tenders were received, Stephen Construction Co. \$126,544 for asphalt with cement concrete base, and \$10,255 for asphalt on macadam base. Norman P. McLeod, \$129,040 for asphalt with cement base. No cement in track section.

"(4) Prince William Street Paving.—Not including asphalt to be laid by Public Works Department. Six tenders were received. The lowest was from the Stephen Construction Company, \$34,207; the next was from James E. Kane, \$36,583; and others were H. O. Clark, \$40,332, and B. Mooney and Sons \$41,823.

"None of the foregoing figures cover curbs and sidewalks by the city, engineering and incidentals."

He said the engineering costs would be determined when the class of paving was decided on; meanwhile, he recommended:

"(1) That the Marsh Road paving be laid by the Public Works Department on same specifications as prepared for the contractors, estimated cost, including engineering and incidentals, \$-.

"(2) That Norman P. McLeod be awarded the contract for the Douglas avenue paving, asphalt on cement concrete base on sides of street, and asphalt on broken stone base in track section, estimated cost, including curbs, sidewalks, engineering and incidentals, \$-.

"(3) That James E. Kane be awarded the contract for paving Prince William street, the Public Works Department laying the asphalt surface on the sides of the roadway, estimated to cost \$-.

Mayor Hayes said he would not support any motion to have contracts let until a plebiscite had been taken. After a discussion the matter was laid over.

The marriage took place in Cape Town, South Africa, on January 14, of Mrs. Outram, widow of Edmund Darden Outram, St. John and Montreal, to Roger Kendall, New Quay, Cornwall, England. The bride, before her first marriage, was Miss Beatrice Nash, Port Elizabeth, South Africa. She was returning to her home there after a year's sojourn in England, where she met Mr. Kendall. The marriage was celebrated on the day of their arrival at Cape Town. Mr. and Mrs. Kendall have gone to Johannesburg, where they will in future reside.

S.S. CORSICAN DOCKED YESTERDAY

Had Uneventful Voyage from Liverpool—Brought Good General Cargo and Nine Hundred Passengers for Western Canada.

The C. P. O. S. liner Corsican docked yesterday morning at No. 2 berth, Sand Point, after a usual voyage from Liverpool. In addition to a good general cargo the ship brought 900 passengers many of them women and children. There was on the passenger list a Canadian officer and thirteen other rank besides a party of Imperials, numbering eleven officers, thirteen women and the same number of children. The passengers were all for the West and were quickly despatched on three C. P. R. special trains.

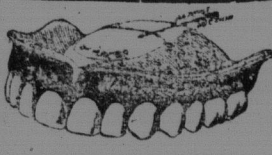
