Winnipeg, April 13.—Rev. Father Damas Dandarand, O. M. I., who on March 23 last, celebrated his 102nd anniversary, died this evening in St. Boniface, Man. He was the oldest Oatholic priest in the world, being born on March 23, 1819, in the village of La Prairie, Que, of French parentage.
