

In the Prince Albert dis trict for fifty miles Herman Finger bid \$510 and William Anderson \$550. This imit went to the highest bidder. For second choice, a year later, in 1901, Finger bid \$5,000 and one McCraken, represent ing Anderson, bid \$5,670. Again the high-est trader won.
