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PREMIER HAZEN OUTLINES GOVERNMENT POLICY

Explains New Highway Act, Its Chief Features, and Method of Expending Moneys

May Extend Central Railway to Gibson if Outlook Warrants It—Intimates That Last Bonus to St. John Cold Storage Company Will Not Be Sanctioned—Hon. C. W. Robinson Opens the Ball for the Opposition.

Fredericton, N. B., May 1.—The house met at 9:45 p. m. Hon. Mr. Hazen introduced a bill to amend the schools act.

The gentleman who moved the address lapsed into one of his flights of oratory and controversy. He referred with pride to the crown lands of the province and spoke in glowing terms of the great heritage which was theirs.

When they appealed to the people to elect them they naturally expected that if the people wished the province to be governed in the most satisfactory way possible they would have re-elected them.
