There was an interesting discussion in the Commons' Public Accounts Committee a few days ago in reference to the expenditure of public monies for Secret Service. It was not hinted that the Government had improperly expended any portion of this money, but it was felt to be desirable that the accounts connected with such expenditure should be audited by a special committee, sitting in private, on which both the Opposition and the Government to employ the public funds in this manner, and as it is supposed to be entirely in the interests of the whole Public and not of Party, there can be reasonable objection offered to such an audit, unless, indeed, the gravity and delicacy of the circumstances under which such funds are applied should supercede all other considerations.
