The major league clubs may have snared a couple more home-run monarchs of 1920, for a few of the official

statisticians of the minor leagues neglected to make public the data on four baggers as applied to individuals.

The home run kind of the American Association—Bunny Brief of Otto Knabe's Cowboys—didn't advance, but the Reds bought for cash a player and

Two of the home run kings of 1920 who moved up were briefly tried out in games last fall, Frank Brower, from the International, engaging in 36 combats with Washington, and Frank Wetzell, from the Michigan-Ontario, in seven with St. Louis. Brower hit .311
