DISTRICT AND GENERAL

Common butcher steers were down to \$3.75 on the Toronto market last week.

While driving eight export cattle to town for shipment a farmer near Blenheim had two of them die from overheating.

Mildred Jean, infant daughter of Arthur Purcell, concession 3, Aldborough, died a few days ago after a few hours' illness.

An infection of the tongue, thought to have been caused by the bite of an insect while eating blackberries, resulted in the death of a Pittsburg, Kan., man.

Thirty charges for speeding and other violations of the Ontario Motor Vehicles Act were laid against many individuals in the last few days at Leamington.

This notice is posted in a small town garage for the benefit of the register: "Don't smoke around the place; if your life isn't worth anything, gasoline is."

Seven children of a Wheeling, W. Va., couple have met with violent deaths within the last 15 years. The latest death occurred when their 12-year-old son was drowned.

A baseball tournament will be held at the Middlesex county championship site; also \$200 in cash prizes, open to all rural teams in Middlesex.

Tenders for the proposed enlarging of the town hall at Dutton and making it a memorial hall were considered too high by the council and the work will not be undertaken at present.

After the first of October, or thereabouts no clergyman who is not registered with the Provincial authorities and the holder of a certificate of registration will be permitted to solemnize marriages in Ontario.

Two workmen at Erie, Pa., were swept a mile through an 18-inch concrete tube. They were working inside when a dam burst, carrying them to the lake and throwing them out upon the sand. Both will recover.

Application from three rural telephone companies for permission to increase their rates will be heard at a session of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board on July 26. Among the companies making application is the Carleton Place company.

Calvin E. Craig, son of the late S. J. Craig, pioneer manufacturer and town clerk of Stratford for many years, died at Battle Creek a few days ago. Deceased was a banker and was connected with one of the largest financial institutions of Chicago.

Parkhill has seen the last of the summer Chautauquas for a time. This year's deficit was about \$400 and it was decided to renew the contract at present. Petrolia also reports a deficit, amounting to \$250. On the other hand Watford reports a big financial success.

John Campbell, 6th concession of Carleton Place, died a few mornings ago at 100 to some work and later, when his wife went to look for him, he was found dead in the barn. Campbell had been melancholy, it is stated.—He is survived by his widow, two daughters and one son.

The garden party held by the Farmers' Club and Women's Institute at Wallaceford on July 6th was a big success financially as well as a big success socially. The attendance was over 1,000 and the proceeds \$500. There will be a nice balance to apply on the proposed community hall.

In reply to a delegation of Essex county municipal men, Hon. F. C. Biggs, Minister of Public Works for Ontario, held out little hope that the paving of Talbot road from Jackson's Corners to Essex would be undertaken this year, and as for a concrete paving he stated that such a road would materialize "in the far future."

A surplus of nearly three million dollars and reserves totalling nearly eleven million are shown in the financial statement of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario in the Niagara system for the period ending December 31, 1920. The Niagara system embraces 167 municipalities, rural districts and counties.

W. McMaster, Appin, had his head badly cut when he plunged through the windshield of his car after colliding with another motor on the Pipe Line road, London, a few nights ago. He was taken to Victoria Hospital by the owner of the car with which he collided. After his injuries were dressed he proceeded to his home. His car was badly damaged.

The Canadian Government has recently enacted laws for the protection of the public against so-called eye specialists, professors and eye doctors who are making a house-to-house canvass in certain sections of the country. The Optical Association of Canada has sent out warning that these so-called specialists do not represent and are in no way connected with the Association.

Apiarists in this district predict a large yield of honey of better quality than has been produced since 1918. The season thus far has been very favorable to honey production and the tremendous increase in the white clover crop, which is to be seen in abundance even along the roadsides in some sections, is taken as an indication that the honey will be of superior quality. The price, it is said, will be lower than has prevailed for the past two years.

CHAUTAUQUA AT GLENCOE

This is Chautauqua week at Glencoe. It is the first time a series of these entertainments has been attempted here, and it was with no little trepidation that the problem of its success was faced by the guarantors. There is little to fear now, however, as there is good reason to believe that the enterprise will not only win its way to public favor but that the financial end will be more than gratifying.

The Chautauqua tent is pitched on the public school grounds, a clean and convenient spot and suitable in every way. On Monday afternoon the opening concert was given, after Mr. Dickson, on behalf of the local committee, had briefly introduced the Chautauquans and given them a welcome to the town. The attendance was good—in fact, the manager stated, the most encouraging opening they had had this season. In the evening the tent was filled to capacity and the succeeding concerts so far show in the attendance that the interest is more than being maintained.

The management are to be congratulated on finding such good talent to the doors of the people of this community, and those who fail to attend the concerts are missing a rare treat indeed.

The remaining entertainments of the series are announced as follows: Wednesday evening—Presentation of the famous comedy success, "Cometentment," by the Elias Day Play Company.

Thursday afternoon—Program of high-class and popular music, featuring scenes from some of the best comic operas, by Ferguson's Light Opera Quintette.

Thursday evening—Lecture, "Reconstruction Problems in the British Empire," by Hon. Percy Alden, member of the House of Commons, London. Musical program by Ferguson's Light Opera Quintette.

Chautauqua Notes
What is considered one of the most outstanding features of the series so far presented was the lecture delivered Monday evening by Dr. Rabb of Boston on the 100 per cent man.

The lecturer has had a varied life and has filled his lecture with personal incidents and anecdotes that held the attention of his audience from beginning to end, at the same time driving home the hometruths that he has for everyone with a force that cannot fail to leave his hearers impressed.

The Scott Concert Company which took the bulk of the program on Monday afternoon and evening is composed of the following artists: Chester Scott, vocalist; Carl Webster, violinist; Mrs. Scott, pianist and guitarist; and Hattie Voegelge Webster, reader pianist.

Chester Scott stands among the first of the stars of the day. His rendition of "The Carnival de Venice" and "The Mocking Bird" was a revelation in vocal playing.

Carl Webster, violinist, comes to the Dominion circuit as an artist who has toured in Lyceum and Chautauqua for the past ten years. Mr. Webster played the "A Minor Concerto" by de Bériot and Musini's "Mazurka de Concert." As an encore he responded with two old Scotch songs.

Hattie Voegelge Webster gave several readings which kept the audience in a good humor and added much merit to the program. She showed her ability as pianist and accompanist in the various overtures and solos rendered.

Mrs. Chester A. Scott, pianist and guitarist, accompanied Mr. Scott on the piano and is to be commended for her support. The popular selections for piano and guitar, by Mr. and Mrs. Scott, were full of pep and rhythm. They responded to encores.

DEATH OF RICHARD REYCRRAFT

Mosa township lost another of its sturdy pioneers and highly esteemed citizens in the passing away on Friday, July 15, of Richard Reyrcraft, in his 90th year, following a six months' illness.

The late Richard Reyrcraft was born in the county of Cork, Ireland, in 1831. When 25 years of age he came with his wife to Canada, making his home in London for seven years. He then settled in the township of Mosa on the farm which he occupied continuously up to the time of his death. Though not among the earliest of the pioneers, Mr. Reyrcraft experienced much of the strenuous life of those who helped to reclaim the fine agricultural land of his township from the virgin forest and was rewarded with a mead of success above the average. He was a consistent member of the Glencoe Methodist Church for many years and was held in the highest esteem in the community. Up to the time he was taken to his bed, some six months ago, he enjoyed the best of health and was unusually active for one of his age.

He is survived by a family of six sons and three daughters, namely: Thomas, of Detroit; Elias, William, John, Richard and Joseph, of Mosa township; Mrs. W. J. Rowe, of Idaho; Mrs. F. W. Gubbins, of Metcalfe, and Jennie, at home.

The funeral service was held in the Methodist church on Sunday afternoon, and was conducted by the pastor, Rev. R. J. Garbutt, interment being made at Oakland cemetery. His six sons acted as pallbearers.

Among the large number who attended to pay their last mark of respect were relatives and friends from Detroit, Highgate, Alvinston and Watford.

Elliott & Moss, Glencoe, acting for Duncan C. Gillies of Mosa township, have issued a writ in the county court, against the Canadian Oil & Gas Company of Niagara Falls, claiming a balance due their client of \$385.80 under an oil and gas lease made to the plaintiff to Leo Wilson in 1917. The plaintiff claims that the lease was later assigned to the defendants and that they are entitled to the value of a one-seventh share of the oil produced. Damages are also asked for alleged damage to crops, timber and improvements.

The body will arrive at Goderich on Thursday morning and a service will be held in Glencoe Methodist church on Thursday at one o'clock. Mr. Ford is survived by two brothers, Rev. J. E. Ford of Goderich and Dr. S. P. Ford of Norwood. He leaves no family.
