REPORT CANADIAN GOODS IN DEMAND

Start Campaign in Britain for Empire Shopping Week.

London, Nov. 2.—Caniffie Lister and Neville Chamberlain have circulated the Lord Mayors, Mayors and chairmen of urban and rural district councils asking support for a proposal that in every town in England and Wales there be held before Christmas a shopping week for solely Empire goods. The circular points out that by increasing the purchase of British goods in the home market they will reduce the volume of foreign imports and improve the trade balance, thus enabling the country to invest more in the development of new markets. By increasing purchases of Empire goods they will enable Empire countries to buy more from the Mother Country. The circular states the belief that the Christmas season would be an extremely suitable period for the quickening of the national movement to help British and Imperial trade.

London's big stores have shown a commendable spirit in leading the way in this movement, such organizations as the Haymarket Stores, Harrods, Bakers and Selfridges repeatedly have made splendid displays of Dominion goods, especially Canadian, and several have issued price-lists of Empire products. I am informed that the sales of Canadian goods in particular have increased 200 per cent. during the past year. Their willingness to assist Empire trade is voiced by Sir Woodman Burbridge, of Harrods. Commenting on the latest move, he says: "Not only a British shopping week but British shopping all the year round should be aimed at in my opinion."

Sir Sydney Skinner, chairman of Barker's, said that a push such as that proposed by the Ministers was particularly needed in certain trades. In visiting Haymarket Stores he found signs up at every entrance: "Visit our British Empire Display of Goods." One manager expressed himself as highly gratified with the results of the campaign of the past year, saying that Canadian goods in particular were selling well, as long as the grading and standard were good.

I find the general view obtains that, with the first quality goods and with advertising such as that of Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, Canada could seize a commanding position in the London market. Now is a favorable time for Canadian interests to get into the limelight and thus avail themselves of what the Wembley Exhibition has done for them, instead of waiting until the Exhibition's impetus is lost and the ground has to be regained at a big expense.

B. C. PIONEER DEAD.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 2.—Stephen T. Hall, 79, a British Columbia pioneer, who held the post of express agent and postmaster at 160 Mile House in the Cariboo District in the days of the gold rush, died here yesterday. He was born in Halifax.

STUDENTS FINED.

Toronto, Nov. 2.—Eighty-one University of Toronto students have each been fined \$5 by the University authorities for their participation in a "raid" on Trinity College residence, during which several clergymen visiting the college were driven from their beds by a stream of water from hose pipes in the hands of the students.

DUMPED ALCOHOL INTO ST. JOHN SEWER

3,200 Gallons of Seized Contraband Destroyed by Customs.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 3.—Officers of the preventive service were busy today at the bonded warehouse in Main street dumping approximately 3,200 gallons of alcohol into the sewer. The alcohol was in 30 puncheons of about 40 gallons each. It was contraband stuff, it is said, and since they were unable to sell it for more than the duty, which is about \$10 per proof gallon, the order was given for its destruction.

J. E. MARCILE, M. P., IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Member Elect for Bagot, Que., Has Been Taken to Hospital.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—The condition of Jos. Edmond Marcile, M. P.-elect for Bagot, Que., and representative of that constituency in the House of Commons since 1918, was reported today by his physicians to be "very poor." He was taken to Hotel Dieu Hospital last night after an illness which has prevented him from taking part in the contest in which he was elected by a majority of over 700. An operation was not contemplated, it was reported at the hospital.

SCHOONER DAMAGED.

Miami, Fla., Nov. 3.—The four-masted Canadian schooner Mabel E. Gunn is tied up at the docks here with half its port rail torn away. Part of its deckload of fish is drifting somewhere in the North Atlantic. The schooner brought two million laths for Miami from Halifax.

Montreal, Nov. 3.—Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railway, sails to-morrow from New York on the liner Mauretania for a brief visit to England.

Sir Henry while in London will deal with matters pertaining to the European interests of the Canadian National system, an official statement made at company headquarters announced.

CZECHO-SLOVAKIAN DEBT AGREEMENT

London, Nov. 3.—An agreement for settlement of the Czecho-Slovakian debt to Great Britain was signed today.

Eighty thousand pounds, advanced through President Masaryk for Czecho-Slovakia's urgent war needs, are to be repaid here immediately. The sum of nine hundred thousand pounds is made payable in ten annual installments.

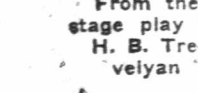
