of this extraordinary man than the warmest eulogies partiality could devise. It is a circumstance not unworthy of remark, that the officer in command of the American army on this untoward day was no other than General Harrison, the man to whom Tecumseh had so often, and so successfully, been opposed on the banks of the Wabash. It is but rendering justice to the former to say, that the sentiments which he expressed when the circumstance and manner of the warrior's death were first announced, were such as to reflect credit upon him both as a man, a gentleman, a Christian, and a soldier.
