

UNB Beavers didn't give their opponents a chance

UNB Beavers swimming and diving team returned from Acadia this weekend with another Atlantic Universities Athletic Association (AUAA) conference title. Under the coaching of Gary Brown, the Beavers have won the title three times out of the last five years but have shown an overwhelming dominance in all events this year.

Thursday evening, UNB started their victory with Mike Brown placing second in the 1650 yard Freestyle, breaking the old conference record by one second and Dave Pretlove, new to the distance event, placing seventh. To finish off, the Medley Relay team of Bruce Williams, Craig Maitland, Paul Steeves, and John MacGillivray placed second overall behind Acadia, with both teams breaking the old record.

Team returned the next day to begin the individual event with Dave Banks placing first in the 200

yard Freestyle, setting a new record and placing in Division II Nationals and with MacGillivray placing sixth in the finals.

Williams started to prove his dominance in the Backstroke events by placing first in the 200. UNB's depth started to show in the Breast stroke with Paul Steeves tying for first place in the finals but placing second to the Acadia swimmer on a judges decision with Bill Curtis placing fifth.

Maitland qualified for the Nationals with a second place finish in the 100 fly, meeting the standard by one second and placing fourth in the following event, the 50 yard freestyle.

Brown set a new conference record in the 400 yard Individual Medley breaking his old record by 5 seconds and qualifying for the Nationals.

With a break in the events before the 800 yard Freestyle, the divers

started the ball rolling by tying up all the placings on the three meter board. John Thompson, Dale MacLean, Gary Kelly, Ewen Dickson and Mike Allard placed first to fifth respectively with coach Jeff Dean left in amazement.

The final event of the day was the strong victory for UNB in the 800 Freestyle Relay with a new conference record by teammates Paul Steeves, Mike Brown, John MacGillivray, and the strong anchor of David Banks bringing home the victory. UNB finished the second day of competition more confident to win the championship leading the by 30 points over rival Acadia.

Saturday brought the UNB team into the finals to prove to their rivals their high calibre of team effort.

The first event was the 200 Individual Medley with Banks and

Steeves first and second respectively with both swimmers breaking the conference record and Banks qualifying once more for the Nationals.

MacGillivray surprised everyone with a fourth in the 100 yard Freestyle.

Depth showed once more on the part of the UNB team with Banks, Pretlove, John Bennet placing first fourth and sixth out of the six finalists.

Brown and Maitland showed their strength and endeavour by placing fourth and fifth in the 200 yard Butterfly, putting the UNB score even further ahead.

Williams, showing peak performance, placed first in the 100 yard Backstroke, with a new conference record and missing the Olympic trials time by five tenths of a second.

Record breaking performances by Steeves proved his superiority by breaking his old conference record by two-tenths of a second and qualifying for the Olympic trials by eight tenths of a second under the standard.

The divers went to the one metre board to completely dominate the diving competition by a repeat performance of Thompson, MacLean, Kelly, Allard and Dickson placing first to fifth respectively.

To finish off the AUAA

championships the UNB team consisting of Maitland, Steeves, Banks, and Williams placed fourth in the 400 yard Freestyle Relay to retain the championship trophy.

Bruce MacDonald, Bill Caldwell and Peter Zwicker placed alternate in their events missing the finals but putting on a strong showing for UNB.

The overall scores were, UNB - 169, Dalhousie - 104, Memorial - 90, Acadia - 88 and Mount Allison - 15.

Ten members of the Beavers were selected to represent the AUAA at the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union (CIAU) National Championships.

Banks, Steeves, Maitland, Williams and the entire diving team of Thompson, MacLean, Kelly, Allard and Dickson were all chosen as members of the team.

UNB set eight new conference records overall and proved to be a team, which was uncontested with their strong peak performances.

The Most Outstanding Male Swimmer award went to Banks for record breaking performances in the 500 Freestyle and the 200 Individual Medley and for placing first in the 200 Freestyle and being a member of the winning 800 Freestyle Relay team.

The Beavers are now in the process of training for the CIAU National championships to be held in Waterloo on March 8 to 10.

UNB's wrestling team, the Black Bears, are still on the prowl although their intercollegiate season is over. Last weekend, all five of the wrestlers from UNB who went to the New Brunswick Open Wrestling championships held in

Moncton, George Pineau, captured first place in the 109 pound class; Dave Niles won the 154 pound division; Rick Cuthbertson was first in the 163 pound spot and Rod Bell captured the heavyweight honors.

Wrestling Club, was the winner in the 149 pound bracket. With the exception of Ballack, who competed in the Senior class, all of the UNB contingent won their titles in the Junior classification.

The winners of the N.B. open will be eligible to compete in the Atlantic Open championships to be held in St. John's, Newfoundland March 5 and 6. Any of the successful grapplers in that contest will be eligible to compete in the Canadian Open championships to be held the following weekend.

This weekend, three of the Bears go to the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union (CIAU) wrestling championships in Thunder Bay, Ontario. Pineau, Cuthbertson and Bell along with Coach Jim Born will travel to the tourney slated for Lakehead University.

The season, so ended for the UNB Red Devils, has been a disappointing one for all involved. The young team, which seemed to suffer from a generation gap between seniors and rookies, seemed to have what it takes to win games but just couldn't put it all together.

First year defenseman Dave Neill put it this way. "We just haven't been able to pull it together." Neill stated. "I don't know what's wrong, what it is, but everyone's to blame, I think."

When questioned as to whether he was looking forward to a better season next year, coach MacGillivray replied, "Oh God - we'll have to have a better season next year or there won't be a program the year after."

MacGillivray said that he was finishing this year with a feeling of relief. For him and for the Red Devils it had been a bad season and he's felt this year's edition of UNB's hockey representatives is one of the most difficult to understand yet. Problems have abounded from the attitudes of his players and MacGillivray is hoping that natural processes will weed out the problem individuals for next year.

For the most part, the UNB Red

Devils will be little untouched by the processes of graduation and eligibility. Playing in their final seasons of intercollegiate hockey are seniors Jerry Grant and captain Doug McDonald, as well as Donnie Kinsman, all of whom have played four years of intercollegiate hockey.

Another familiar face will be missing from the 1976-77 lineup in the person of Pat Morrisette, a sophomore defenseman, who has turned in a favourably impressive year. Morrisette was among the top scorers on the squad this year and supplied the Red Devils with tough steady defense as well.

So the season for the Red Devils ends on a winning note and leaves them with five wins to their credit. But one must not overlook the number of one goal games to be found among their 11 losses during the season.

In other AUHC action this past weekend, the league leading St. Mary's Huskies were handed their first loss of the season's campaign when they fell 10-8 to the U de M Blue Eagles. The Huskies, who were undefeated in 15 starts, finish the season with a 15-1 record and have earned the right to host the AUHC championships slated for Halifax this coming weekend.
