

as between Canada and Britain, would be the most important of all the matters likely to come up for consideration and discussion. It was the ^{realization} ~~recognition~~ of the importance of the British market for Canadian wheat which, so far as Canada ^{was} ~~is~~ concerned, gave to the Imperial Economic Conference of 1930 its real significance.

Up to this point I think it may be said that, with the exceptions as mentioned, there was in the main pretty general agreement.

Wherein then was there cause for difference?

The difference arose over the question of method - the method by which the objective, held in common, was to be achieved; difference in the methods to be employed to gain the market in Britain for Canadian wheat. ^{There was difference as well as to the economic policy held with respect to policies proposed. In a sense the two are interrelated.}

Sincerity of Motive.

Here let me pause to say that in no particular do I question the sincerity of my right honourable friend the Prime Minister to achieve the objective which, I believe, we hold in common, nor his sincere belief in the efficacy of the method or ^{policy} ~~method~~ by which he ^{believes} ~~believes~~ that objective can be obtained.
