His suggestion was that possibly a committee of the Government might consult with the officers of the various leagues and teams, and so arrive at a code of rules which would effectively prevent the ruffianising of any sport particularly in danger.

It is as well for the officers of law and order to take this matter up voluntarily with the hope of preventing trouble instead of waiting for trouble to be brought to them by criminal cases. All blame should not be put on the players. They are young men of high spirits and splendid physical condition. The shock of conflict spurs them on in competitive vigor until the earnest of the struggle begins to wear an iron face. When the blood is hot, one chance blow seems to call for another; and then the return blow which, as naturally follows, may not be so clearly the treation of chance. The non-player who imagines that he could play as vigorously as any without ever thinking that he might in a moment of passion hit with a purpose, can test himself by letting some one strike him unexpectedly over the shins with a sharp stick.

But it is the businesss of trained athletes to learn self-restraint; and this will best be taught by rules which make the lack of it fatal to the player's success. We seldom hear of a pugilistic encounter being lost through a foul blow, though the provocation and temptation must at times be intense. But the pugilists are well-seasoned in self-restraint. They know that one slip of temper may cost them the contest. Now, if this same pressure were put upon the young men of wholly gentlemanly instincts, who play at the spirited games to which we take our wives and daughters, the result would almost infallibly be the same selfrestraint.

The cure lies in hockey having referees enough, and then encouraging them to rule off rough players for the entire game. One piece of deliberately rough play ought to be enough to practically lose the team guilty of it that match. Harsh, do you say? But surely the ethics of pugilism; and one foul blow loses a pagilist the fight! A player guilty of repeatedly rough tactics ought to be "ruled off for life," to quote Prinsipal Peterson. Similar rulings would clean up both lacrosse and football as well. The only penalties which the players really fear would thus be applied to prevent the only crime

This can all be done by the leaders in these sports themselves; and they will not object to their hands being strengthened by such action as Judge Teetzel proposes. But we must not depend too much upon the officials of criminal justice to keep our sports in the class to which they properly belong. Yet our sports have already led to the prisoner's dock; so that we need not be so optimistic as the neglect of doing anything about the matter at all.-Montreal Star.
