side points attended the convention yesterday at Guild Hall of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance. Rev Dr. Carman, the President, was in the chair, and in his ad-

dress referred to the strong feeling of dissatisfaction created through the Privy Council's decision regarding Sunday labor. He said the decision

should be carefully weighed and every detail considered by the members of the Alliance. In referring to the general work of the association, he laid stress on the fact that the members should look to great principles rather than little ideas.

The following letter to the Secretary was read from Mr. E. Saunders, chief officer, license branch department of Provincial Secretary:—"I am directed by the Hon. the Provincial Secretary to state, in reply to that part of your letter of the 26th ult. in which-you ask him, in effect, to make or authorize a public declaration of the policy of the Government in regard to the administration of the liquor license laws, that the Minister recognizes the reasonableness of this request, and is glad to avail himself of the opportunity thus afforded him to say, as gublicly as possible, that the department is willing, and, indeed, anxious, to do all that can be expected to be done to bring about a proper enforcement of the law, and, where it is shown that inspectors, through negligence, incapacity or other cause, fail to efficiently discharge their duties, their removal will in all cases certainly follow. The Minister desires to point out that the great difficulty in the way of satisfactory enforcement of the act, especially in large and consequently over-officered districts, must be obvious to everybody who considers the circumstances.
