Securities That Treasury is Ready to Buy
By Special Wire to the Courier.
London, Jan. 6.—The initial list of the American securities, which the treasury is prepared to buy or borrow under the mobilization scheme was published yesterday. Includes also, however, American telephone and telegraph, General Electric, New York Telephone, and United States Steel shares. Canada is represented only by Canadian Pacific six per cent notes.

The railways down on the list are the Santa Fe, Baltimore and Ohio, Central Pacific, Jersey Central, Chesapeake and Ohio, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, Chicago, St. Louis and New Orleans, Erie, Illinois Central, Kansas City Terminal, Lake Shore, Long Island, Louisville and Nashville, the Soo Line, New York Central, Northern Pacific, Oregon Short Line, Oregon and Washington, Pennsylvania, Reading, Southern Railway, Union Pacific, and Southern Pacific. An extension of this list is promised shortly.

The prices to be paid will be posted Friday. The committee has invited offers of any other desirable dollar securities, but contains no government, state or municipal issues and no stock issues.

VARITIES

FREE FOUR WEEKS COURSE OF LECTURES ON AGRICULTURE

In St. George Fire Hall, Jan. 11th and Feb. 8th, 1906.

Admission—No tuition fees. No entrance standard. No text books needed. No examinations.

Application should be made to the Department of Agriculture, Paris.

Hours—The forenoon, from 9:30 to 12 o'clock, will be devoted to classroom work. In the afternoon it will take the form of practical work in stock judging, tree pruning, milk testing, etc.

This course of lectures is designed to benefit more especially those farmers' sons or young farmers who have been out of school for some time and feel the need of a better education.

We feel that no young man can afford to start farming unless he has good understanding of the fundamental principles of Agriculture, and we aim to supply him with these essentials.

OUTLINE OF SUBJECTS

Animal Husbandry—History and characteristics of the different breeds of live stock, breeding, feeding and the management of farm stock. Visits will be made to different stock farms and where practical work in stock judging will be conducted.

Poultry—Breeds, feeding, housing, killing, dressing, care and management of the flock.

Field Husbandry—Field crops adapted to this district. Selection of seed varieties, rotation of crop, practical work in pruning, spraying and manufacturing of the different spraying materials. Culture of small fruits.

Soil—The important constituents of the soil, grass and clover seeds in structures and the relation of plants to soil, light, temperature and moisture.

Insects—Study of the common insects, life history habits and means of control.

Fungus Diseases—A study of the common fungus diseases which occur on the farm, rusts, smuts, rots, blights, scabs and methods of control.

Bacteriology—A short study of the bacteria in soil, milk, silage and some bacterial diseases.

Agriculture—General characteristics of soils, management of the soil, the common bee diseases, cause, nature and means of prevention.

Veterinary Science—A short series of lectures on the common diseases of farm stock, causes, symptoms and remedies by a practical veterinary.

Special Lectures—Arrangements have been made to have prominent agriculturists to deliver lectures from time to time during the course. Programme for this will be announced later.

Competitions—Any of the young men attending this course are eligible to take part in the following competitions. The winner in each case is sent to Guelph for the two weeks' course in stock and seed judging with all expenses paid the following winter.
