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FIX PRICES ON GRAIN OUTPUT

Canadian Commission Appointed to Control Elevator Shipments

HAVE LARGE POWERS Authorized to Take Offers From the Allied Governments

Ottawa, June 11.—The commission to control the grain production of Canada will be composed of Dr. Magill, chairman; H. W. Woods, Alberta; S. K. Bothwell, Moose Jaw; T. A. Creever, J. C. Gage, W. A. Bawif, W. A. Matheson and C. A. Stewart, of Winnipeg; William A. Best, of Ottawa; Controller Ainey, of Montreal; and L. H. Clarke, of Toronto.

To Co-operate With U. S. Body

Little action is possible on the part of the commission until such time as a similar body is appointed by the United States, with similar powers to co-operate with the Canadian commission. Pending the appointment of such an American commission the Canadian commission will seek to keep prices on a parity with those in the United States.

The commission has been granted great power and will have authority to fix grain prices on shipment from storage elevators, but not the price paid the farmer. They have power to take offers of purchase from the British and allied Governments and to determine what quantity to sell and the price required. They can take grain from elevators without the consent of the owners and fix the price to him and to the purchaser. They can investigate the storage and accumulation of grain and remedy any unfair restraint of marketing.

HOW TO KEEP WELL

POLLUTING STREAMS.

SOME OF THE WORST epidemics of typhoid fever have been in mountain towns where the people drink the clear water of some tumbling mountain stream. No doubt the thought of the city fathers is that water that is so limpid and so filled with air by falls and rapids cannot be impure.

Whenever it has been possible to run down the source of infection it has been found that some group of people have been polluting the stream, thinking they were doing no harm because "running water purifies itself," according to the popular idea.

Every year a number of campers come back to their homes suffering from typhoid fever. In many instances it has been found that the unfortunate had camped on the bank of some beautiful mountain stream. The water in this stream was so cold and clear that the campers had no hesitation in drinking it freely. Ordinarily, and in fact, there is a fair chance that typhoid will develop, for the rapid flow of a mountain stream carries the bacilli to down-stream consumers before there has been time for purification.

The following are the Provincial laws regarding pollution of waters, (Sections 90-91 Public Health Act, Ontario):

"The Provincial Board shall have the general supervision of all springs, wells, ponds, lakes, streams, or rivers used as a source for a public water supply with reference to their purity, together with the waters feeding the same; and shall examine the same from time to time when the necessity so arises, and enforce what, if any, pollution exists and the cause thereof." 2 Geo. V. c. 58, s. 90.

"(1) No garbage, excreta, manure, vegetable or animal matter or filth shall be discharged into or be deposited in any of the lakes, rivers, streams, or other waters in Ontario or on the shores or banks thereof."

"(2) The owners and officers of boats and other vessels plying upon any such lake, river, stream, or other water shall so dispose of the garbage, excreta, manure, vegetable or animal matter or filth upon such boats or vessels as not to create a nuisance or enter or pollute such lake, river, stream, or other water."

"(3) Residents of a health resort or summer resort shall so dispose of garbage, excreta, manure, vegetable or animal matter or filth as not to create a nuisance or permit of its gaining entrance to or polluting any such lake, river, stream, or other water."

"(4) Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this section shall incur a penalty not exceeding \$100." 2 Geo. V. c. 58, s. 91.

VACCINATION AGAINST TYPHOID FEVER.

Those who go camping or who visit summer resorts where there may be a question about the purity of the water or as to the general sanitary conditions would do well to have their doctor vaccinate them against typhoid and paratyphoid fever. The record of the Canadian Army for 1916 in respect to these diseases is an object lesson worth considering.

The Department of Militia and Defence have just announced that for the twelve months ending December 31st, 1916, 167 cases only of typhoid fever were reported as having occurred amongst the many thousands of men of the C. E. F. in Canada, and that notwithstanding the fact that typhoid fever is a disease especially affecting young adults from seventeen to thirty years of age, and a disease which is endemic in all parts of Canada.

This comparative freedom on the part of the C. E. F. is seen to be most striking when it is recalled that, during the Boer War, one man out of every nine in the British Forces in South Africa was invalided through this disease, and that in the Spanish-American War, of 107,000 men in the Camps at Tampa, Florida, and elsewhere, who had not left the shores of the United States, 20,000 contracted the disease. The remarkable change can only be attributed to the progress of inoculation.

The Provincial Board of Health for Ontario has supplied to date all the typhoid and paratyphoid vaccine used by the entire Canadian Expeditionary Force (about 450,000 men). In all, nearly 600,000 doses have been supplied free of cost.

Typhoid inoculation is simple, devoid of any danger whatever, ensures almost certain safety against typhoid, and is supplied free of charge to anyone.

Recipe Column

LOBSTER SOUP

Cut a lobster weighing four pounds in small pieces, place in bowl six crackers roll in flour, dip in egg and salt and pepper. Mix with water and add a little milk and oil. Fry in the mixture, boil for three to four minutes, add the cut lobster and boil up at once.

VEGETABLE SOUP

Chop fine 2 turnips, 2 carrots, 4 potatoes, 2 small onions, few stalks of celery, parsnips if liked. Put into spoonful of rice. Strain soup through colander, set it again over fire. Add piece of butter dredged with flour. Let it boil up and serve.

SCOTCH SOUP

One pound of stewing meat, 1 carrot, grated fine; 1-2 turnip, grated fine; 1-2 of an ordinary sized cabbage chopped fine; 1-2 cup of barley of 1-4 of rice, 1 onion, chopped fine; a little parsley or celery, 4 quarts of boiling water, salt and pepper to taste.

BEAN SOUP

Soak one quart white beans over night. In morning pour off water, add fresh and set over fire until skins will easily slip off; throw into cold water, rub well and skins will rise to top, where they may be removed. Boil beans until perfectly soft allowing two quarts of water to a quart of beans; Mash beans, add flour and butter rubbed together, also salt and pepper. Cut cold bread into small pieces, toast and drop on soup when you serve.

TOMATO BISQUE

Cook 1 quart of tomatoes until tender; add 1-2 teaspoon soda and stir while foaming, strain and return to the fire. Add two level teaspoons butter, salt and pepper to taste, 1 dessertspoon sugar, 2-3 cup of toasted cracker crumbs and enough milk to make it the right consistency. When it boils remove from the fire and serve.
